## Six local wrestlers make national team

Six Georgetown boys have won places on the Canadian team heading to Albuquerque, New Mexico for the World Schoolboy Wrestling Championships on Aug. 3, 4, and 5. In all 23 boys were chosen during a selection tournament at Centennial Middle school over the weekend. The young contenders came from various parts of Ontario and Quebec and will be training at the school for the rest of this week. They leave for Durango, Colorado next week and will spend the first week of August in the heat of Albuquerque.

Saturday's matches saw 27 boys aged 13 and 14 competing against each other to select the top youngsters in each of the 11 categories from 28 to 67 kilos. Sunday 38 boys aged 15 and 16 spent the afternoon striving for a position on the team. Monday the top person in each class could be challenged by the second and third place winners and the boy winning two out of three matches was given the place on the final Canadian team.

Monday's matches produced upsets in two categories as Gary Wharton of Scarborough successfully ousted Georgetown's Kirk Warnock for the 52 kilo class of 13 and 14-year olds. Graham Dadsdwell of Scarborough also replaced Andy DeGuy of Montreal in the 63 kilos class for 15 and 16-year olds.

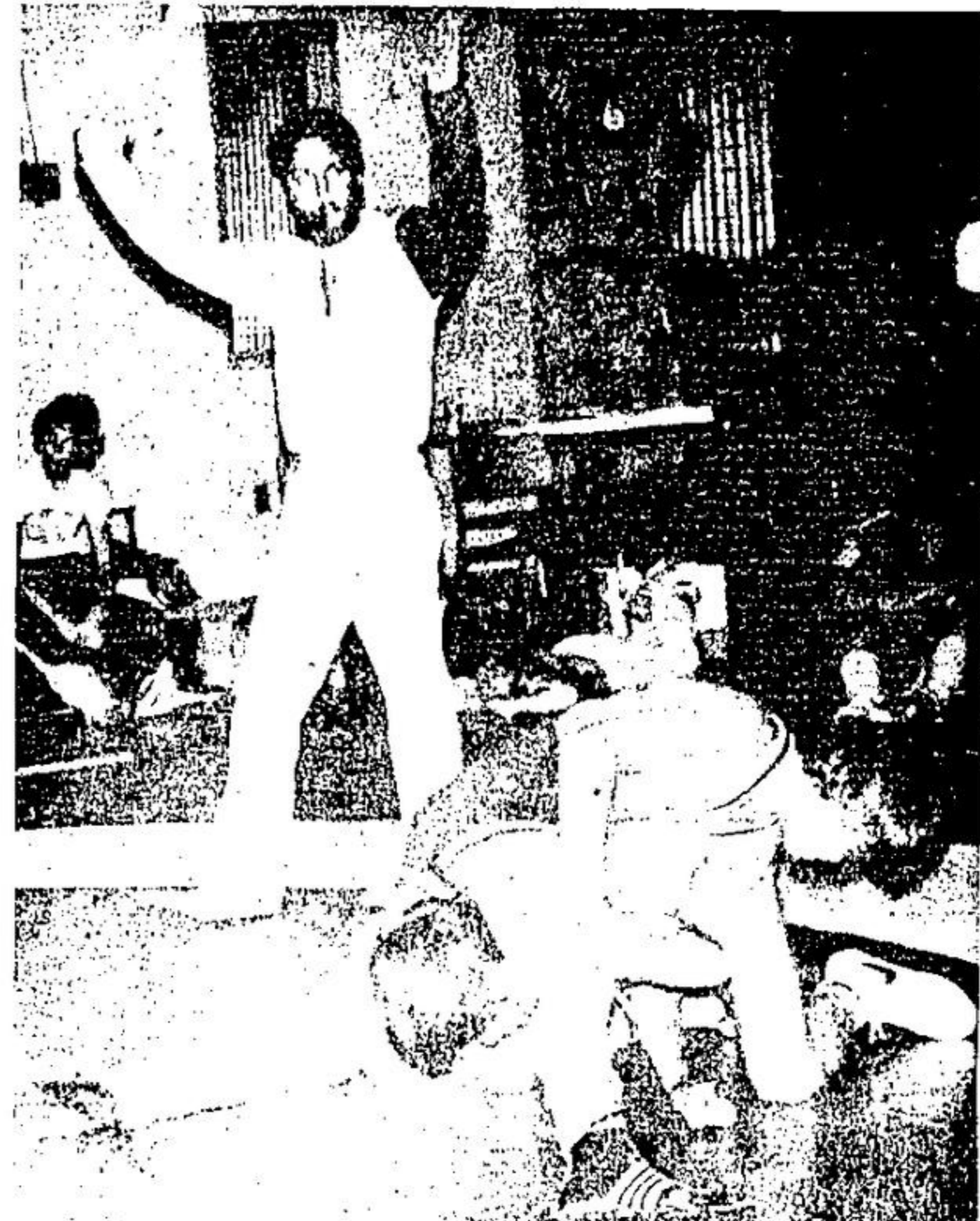
Final selection completed the team now stands at Luigi Raitano, Montreal, 28 kilos; Ronald Hill, Toronto, 32 kilos; Mike Stewart, Montreal, 37 kilos; Kevin Frank, Georgetown, 41 kilos; Chris Manhire, Georgetown, 45 kilos; Gary Wharton, Scarborough, 53 kilos; Mike Murney, Scarborough, 57 kilos; Ken Ward, Georgetown, 62 kilos; and Hanif Remani, Scarborough, 67 kilos. These boys are aged 13 and 14.

The 15 and 16-year-olds are: Mike Taylor, Georgetown; Brad McKenzie, Richmond Hill, 40 kilos; Randy Henderson, Scarborough, 43 kilos; Remigio Castro, Toronto, 48 kilos; Bob McDougall, Fergus, 48 kilos; Rick Pigeon, Pembroke, 51 kilos; Bill Davis, Georgetown, 55 kilos; Jeff Parsons, Toronto, 59 kilos; Graham Dadsdwell, Scarborough, 63 kilos; Dan Hartviksen, Thunder Bay, 68 kilos; Bob Leuthard, Guelph, 73 kilos; and Frank Kendle, Newtonbrook in the open class.

Coaching staff for the team includes Don Brown of Central Technical School, Toronto, as manager, Diane Pickard, a Scarborough elementary school teacher, as team trainer, Patty Hall of New Central St. School, Oakville as athletic therapist, John Pickard of Webster Public School in Scarborough, Jim Hall of Centennial Middle School as the second coach. The boys will not be coached with great stress on winning, Hall says, even though the training will undoubtedly be tough.

# Ray Inglis top vote getter for GIFL all-star game

Third baseman Ray Inglis of Harley Motors led all vote getters for the Georgetown Industrial Fastball League all-star game to be played Sunday at 2 p.m. at the Fairgrounds.

In the voting system there was a possibility of player receiving 55 points. Each team of the 12 teams had one vote, but were not allowed to vote for their own players. A first place vote was worth five points. That means 10 of the 11 teams eligible to vote for Inglis did so and placed him as their number one selection.

In the classic, players who received the first and third highest number of votes will oppose players who received the second and fourth highest totals.

Georgetown Chrysler led all the teams by placing 10 men on the team. First-place Harley Motors and Rexway Towing have had six players chosen. On the first all-star team there is only one player who also received the nod for the position he is playing now for last year's game. Bob Inglis, of DRG Stationery topped the polls for the catchers' position

again this year. The three top vote getters among pitchers last year, Norm Topping, Terry Haines and Joey Deforest, will all be competing again this year.

Ray Inglis was selected as the top shortstop last year. Four other players from last year's first team will be competing in this year's contest. First baseman Blake Inglis, second baseman Bob Luffman, third baseman Phil Hobbin and centrefield Wayne Farrow all received enough votes to qualify this year although not enough to remain on the first all-star team.

## Llewellyn makes team

Clive Llewellyn earned himself a spot on Canada's Commonwealth team at the wrestling trials held over the weekend in Regina, Saskatchewan. Llewellyn will be wrestling in the 68 kilograms class.

It will be the first-time the Georgetown native will be competing in the Commonwealth Games. In 1976 Llewellyn, a graduate of Georgetown district high school, was Canada's representative at the Olympic Games in the same weight class.

Llewellyn, 25, attended Lakehead University in Thunder Bay and later the University of Western in London, Ontario.

He is at present working for the Economic Council in Toronto.

Llewellyn's mother, Margo said Clive is doing most of his training at the University of Toronto campus.

Llewellyn has not been competing as frequently as he did while a student since graduating.

Earlier this year he competed in an international meet in Cuba where he placed second to a East German wrestler. That has been his only competition up to the Commonwealth team trials.

In the Commonwealth Games Llewellyn will not have to wrestle either of the men who defeated him at the Olympic Games in Montreal.

## Defense rose to occasion, says lacrosse coach McCauley

It was all a matter of pride. That is how Ron Wicks of Brampton and manager of the team described Canada's comeback victory to gain the world Field Lacrosse championship.

Besides Wicks, John McCauley of Georgetown and former coach of the Brampton Senior Excelsiors and Bob Burke, leading scorer for the Senior Excels, also made the flight back from England Monday night. Steve Mastine, another former Excelsior, decided to spend another week in England before returning.

"We didn't play well," stated Wicks, talking about Canada's 28-4 drubbing to United States. "They scored at the 10-second mark of the game and took a 10-0 lead. It was a rainy, blurry, muddy day and we played that way," he added.

"We had a couple of good practices, before facing Australia. I think pride and the fact that a lot of the guys wanted to win were the key reasons. All the coaches did a great job, but I think pride was the main reason we won," he summed up.

Bob Burke, who termed the championship as "a lot of fun", stated that the last game was "unbelievable".

"They (U.S.) had a 16-14 lead late in the game and I thought we had lost, but we scored two quick goals to tie the game. We went into overtime and they took a penalty. With 25-seconds remaining, we all knew we had won it," he explained.

"It was nice playing outside," stated Burke. "It was tough getting used to the game," stated the lacrosse player. "I missed all the time over there, but I felt I was gaining experience," he added.

"It is a proud day to be a Canadian," said McCauley. "I am very pleased, it is a good effort," he added.

The defensive coach for the team stated that the club got their box skills and ball offence back against Australia.

"The defence rose to the occasion in both games, and the States just lost their composure," he summed up. The championship was Canada's first in field lacrosse. In 1954, the Canadian team finished fourth just losing the medals.

Canada has not won a medal before, since it swatched from field to box lacrosse in 1956.

The championship was made even sweeter for the Canadians by the fact the States had beaten them so bad earlier in the tournament as well as the fact the U.S. had won the title the last two tournaments.

## Pickells takes a second in Venezuela tournament

Bill Pickells, of the Northern Karate Club in Norval, recently returned from Venezuela where he competed in an international tournament and took a second place in the Black Belt Kata Division.

Pickells, who hails from Huttonville, was the only Canadian competing in the competition. The promoters of the event flew in competitors from all over the world.

Pickells did two kata routines to earn his second place. First place in the division was taken by Tokey Hill of Ohio, who won the same event in the all-Japan Karate Championships last March.

The promoters of the tournament sponsored Pickells from Miami down to Venezuela. The trip to Miami from here was sponsored by Denis Wilson of Zelta Meditator in Brampton. Pickells said the competition in his division was not as tough as he expected it to be. "I have had tougher competition in meets in the United States," he said.

He said that the ceremonial aspects of the meet however were fantastic with the competitors marching into the arena in Olympic Games tradition. Pickells was of course the site member and flag carrier of the Canadian contingent.

The competition was the first of what the promoters hope will become an annual event. Pickells said the sponsors said that next year they will sponsor his trip down to Venezuela all the way from Toronto.

The competition started at 9 a.m. the first day and was not completed until 5 a.m. Pickells said he had to wait until 2:30 in the morning before running his first kata.

On the way back from Florida Pickells also competed in a tournament in Baltimore. He said he did not place in that tournament. It was the first tournament in quite a while that the martial artist has not come home with a trophy.

His trip to Baltimore was sponsored by his mother, Gladys, who lives in Huttonville.

"Without my mother and Denis sponsoring me to these tournaments I would not be able to go so I owe them a lot," Pickells said.

This coming weekend Pickells is hoping to head down to Long Beach, California to compete in the Internationals. He is still looking for a sponsor for that trip.

"I really want to compete in Long Beach," he said. "I have competed in almost every part of North America except there."

While Pickells was in Venezuela he also joined the American Karate Union. "The Union appealed to me because it has a family approach to its members and they really take care of them". Joining the Union may mean that Pickells will be competing in more tournaments in the mid-west of the United States and it could also lead to travelling to Europe and Japan to compete.

Pickells was also told in Venezuela that he may be seeded for the Battle of Atlanta tournament. Seeding Martial Artists for tournaments is a new innovation. That event will be held in October.
