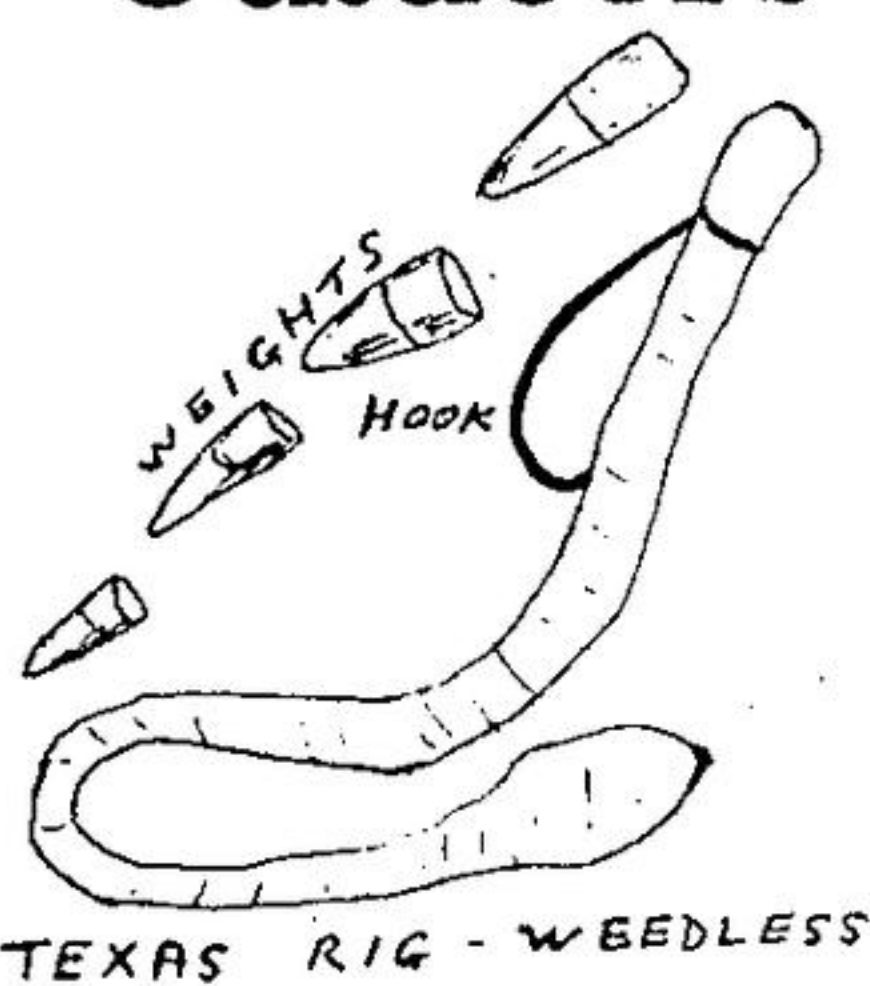

Peregrines released in Ontario, Algonquin Park was the release site and the falcons were bred in captivity by the Canadian Wildlife Service in Alberta. The first four Peregrines will be followed by a second batch in a few weeks time at another site also in Algonquin. It is hoped the falcons will survive and breed replenishing the near extinct Peregrine Falcon in Ontario. Good luck to Gerald McKeating and his staff at the Wildlife Branch of the Ministry of Natural Resources.

KEN LOPTUS, the new Chairman of the Great Lakes Fisheries Commission says they are looking for an alternative to the LAMPTRICIDE program. The application of this chemical is expensive and more efficient methods are needed. I hope they work as well as the lamptride as this cut down the number of lampreys almost to a control level. Fish from the Great Lakes are now for the most part scar fish, although they are still in the lakes. A salmon that I caught off St. Catharines had a lamprey fastened to it, that measured 9 inches indicating that this was a young one, so they are still breeding.

FISHING is still excellent. When weeds are a problem, try a weedless **TEXAS HIGGED** plastic worm. These have been described in this column before but for the new readers I am attaching a diagram of this efficient rig. Drop this worm into "pockets" in the weeds and let it settle. This is where you need a stiff casting rod or at the least a heavy spin or spin casting rod. Just last Saturday, we used spinner baits and bass only took when they were "buzzed" along the surface. I was using a ZEBCO ultra-light 113 and really had my hands full. When the bass are biting on the surface like this, a Heddon Tiny Torpedo is a real hot item for them. Cast it out and let it retrieve until all the rings are gone, and then twitch it, or retrieve it slowly back. Top water thrills that can't be beat.

Tonight on Cable TV channel four, I will have a demo worth watching, and on future programs I will have guests ranging from fishing all the way to hunting and just plain interesting people. You are welcome as a guest if you have something interesting to tell about. Last night I had the privilege of speaking to a group in BRAMPTON, which brought to mind that I am booking now for speaking engagements for the winter months. "The entire event will be focused upon a cultural exchange with our hosts in New Mexico, with an atmosphere of fun prevailing throughout," he said.
The boys are receiving no fundings from official sources, but have had no difficulty in getting sponsors to help them out. Brown says. Ontario boys are getting Wintario support for half their expenses after they make the team but non-Ontario boys are responsible for digging up the entire \$396 on their own.
The championships began in 1975, Mr. Hall says and Canada has sent teams before. The teams were never chosen from eastern Canada, however, and distance is the only thing hindering western Canadian boys from attending. However, tryouts for these teams have always been held in Western Canada and eastern boys were never invited to attend. The selection tournament is open to any boy of the right age who can finance himself for the trip. Ontario boys will be getting help from Wintario but such help is not available to boys from other provinces.
Organizers originally expected a team from Newfoundland but they did not arrive. A mixup of some sort over the weight and age of eligible boys apparently disqualified the ones who had intended to come.
The staff is strictly watching the weight of their young contenders and will not tolerate any great weight loss through the training.
