
### Ontario Outdoors

KEN LOFTUS, the new Chairman of the Great Lakes Fisheries Commission says they are looking for an alternative to the LAMPRICIDE program. The application of this chemical is expensive and more efficient methods are needed. I hope they work as well as the lampricide as this cut down the number of lamprey's almost to a control level. Fish from the Great Lakes are now for the most part scar free, although they are still in the lakes. A salmon that I caught off St. Catharines had a lamprey fastened to it, that measured 9 inches indicating that this was a young one, so they are still breeding.

FISHING is still excellent. When weeds are a problem, try a weedless TEXAS RIGGED plastic worm. These have been described in this column before but for the new readers. I am attaching a diagram of this efficient rig. Drop this worm into "pockets" in the weeds and let It settle. This is where you need a stiff castling rod or at the least a heavy spin or spin easting rod. Just last Saturday. we used spinner bails and bass only took when they were "buzzed" along the surface. I was using a ZEBCO ultra-light 113 and really had my hands full. When the bass are hitting on the surface like this, a Heddon Tiny Torpedo is a real hot item for them. Cast it out and let it settle until all the rings are gone, and then twitch it, or retrieve it slowly back. Top water thrills that can't be beat.
