parking on the street.
Present plans call for two parking places per house, one in the garage and the other in the driveway. There is to be no curbside parking because the road allowance is only 20 feet wide. If this restriction is ignored parked cars could block the road on such public vehicles as ambulances and police and fire equipment.

The fact that a central location must be found adjacent to a town street if the municipal truck is to collect garbage in the development means that garbage may be left out where it can create an eyesore as well as offensive odors, Mr. Hyatt said.

Three of the cluster homes will be within 15 feet of one property owner's home which will cut off light and be an invasion of the present resident's privacy, Mr. Hyatt added.

The Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) ruled favourably Tuesday on the Halton Hills application for approval of bylaw 77-19 to permit the building of 29 cluster homes east of Edward and Margaret

Streets.
Amendment 78-55 to the first bylaw which increased the minimum size of the houses and increased the required number of parking spaces was also approved at the same time because the board felt the amendment merely increased the strictures on the project.
In an oral decision delivered following lunch hour deliberations the board said the approval was given because the project conformed with the town's official plan and the zoning on the area already permitted single family detached residences.
The board viewed the cluster homes as compatible with the existing residential neighborhood and feels the bylaw simply changed the type of lots,

not the density of the development in the area.
The board accepted the assurance from town and region planners and engineers that existing facilities such as schools, sewers and water are available and adequate to provide for the new residents.

Chairman William Dyer said local residents had presented only two major objections to the project. One was concern with possible increased traffic congestion and the other was fear of future erosion problems which might result from disturbance of adjacent slopes during construction.
The board chose to accept evidence from Merity's traffic engineering consultant Ian Holmes and the town's assistant engineer Ted Ballinger which indicated that congestion does occur at the Maple-Delrex intersection but the additional traffic generated by the development would have no adverse effect on the situation.

Delrex Boulevard resident Gordon Richardson had presented a statistical report prepared from "personal observation" using a stop watch which indicated the extent of the congestion and questioned the speed with which public services like fire vehicles and ambulances could reach the area during peak traffic hours.
The board also heard a presentation by Shirley Baillie of Edward Street detailing the amount of erosion already beginning to appear in the gully south of Delrex opposite Carole Street.

Mrs. Baillie questioned the way the Credit Valley Conservation Authority (CVCA) defined the top of the bank on the site and sought assurance that sufficient precautions would be taken to prevent an erosion situation such as presently exists behind Metcalfe Court in Georgetown.
"I'm not an engineer," she said, "so I can't say the engineers can't prevent ero-

sion. But I'd like an explanation of how they're going to do it in words of one or two syllables that I can understand. Maybe then I'll be satisfied I'm comparatively safe. But will those new people be as safe 10 years down the road?"

The board feels it must accept the conservation authority's top of bank line since it is the experts in the field and unless the developer had satisfied the authority with his plans to pick up run off from existing streets and enclose it along with run off from the proposed development, the developer would not have received approval for the project from the CVCA.

Deer causes accident

A car swerved to avoid striking a deer, and ran off the roadway, striking several guardrails and sustaining \$1,000 damage.
The car, driven by Franco Moro, 49, of Acton, was northbound on the 7th Line when a deer ran out in front of the vehicle. The driver swerved in an attempt to avoid the deer, and the car went off the roadway.

Two-car collision

A two-car collision at Mountainview Road South and Sinclair Avenue Saturday resulted in \$2,000 damage to the cars.
A car driven by Leland Chalmers, 19, of Georgetown was making a left turn from Mountainview Road south on to Sinclair Avenue when it was struck by a car which had been northbound on Mountainview Road. The second car was driven by Janie Allen, 31, also of Georgetown.

Georgetown man back from Brazil exchange

Georgetown resident Bob Lang was one of five Canadian businessmen who recently took part in a six-week study of Brazil under the auspices of Rotary International.

The group of five men, headed by Oshawa chartered accountant Gary Fitchett, were participants in the Group Study Exchange Program. In this program, two districts of the world exchange teams of business and the professional men, plus a Rotarian leader, in successive years.

The Rotary Club underwrites the program, the purpose of which is to provide the participants with firsthand experience of the business, social, political, educational, economic and cultural climate of a foreign country. The program attempts "to encourage and develop understanding between nations as a means of promoting world fellowship, harmony and peace."

During Mr. Lang's visit to Brazil, he and the other members of the group spent three days in Rio de Janeiro, five

weeks in the southern state of Parana, one day in Brazilia and two days in the city of Manaus on the Amazon River. While in Parana, the group was able to meet and talk with the Vice-Governor of the state of Parana at the legislative buildings in Curitiba. They also visited such industries as ceramic tile manufacturing, meat processing, textile mills, dairy equipment and industrial equipment manufacturing, instant coffee and dried milk plants, and plywood production.

One of the more memorable experiences during the trip was a visit to the Itaipu hydroelectric project currently under construction on the Parana River near Foz de Iguaçu. This is a joint project between Brazil and Paraguay, and when completed in 1982, will be the world's largest generating 12.6 million kilowatts of power. By comparison, the American Colorado River Project has a potential generating output of 10 million kilowatts, and the Churchill Falls project in Canada has an output of 5.4

million kilowatts. Much of the time they were in the homes of Rotarian families, and were thus able to experience at firsthand the way of life of Brazilian families. In many cases, the host families spoke no English, but members of the groups said they had no trouble communicating.
The next Group Study Exchange Program is scheduled to take place with the Philippines.

Woman accosted in Glen Williams

A Glen Williams resident reported that while she was walking on Main Street, two youths began to verbally abuse her. When she ignored them, they began throwing stones at her, and she was struck by one. The Youth Bureau is continuing the investigation.
