Reminders offensive, board reviews use

The library's present reminders sent out on overdue books are offensive and need to be changed, library board member Betty Fisher said at last week's meeting of the Halton Hills library board.

Mrs. Fisher said that while she was moving she received a letter from the library saying that her daughter had several overdue library books, and the library had no choice but to ask her to pay for the missing books. Mrs. Fisher said she assumed that a first reminder had gone astray during her

Mrs. Fisher suggested that the library should extend the overdue period from three months to six months before sending out overdue notices and reminders. It is very poor public relations, because I found that letter rather offen-

sive, she said. She pointed out that as far as children's books are concerned many parents are not aware of how many books their children have taken out. She also said that a parent is not responsible for paying for books lost by his

Mrs. Cornwell said the problem of dealing with overdue. library books has been discussed informally by the board, and the item is on the policy committee agenda. She said in a number of companies, including the Rand Corporation, have done studies on the most effective time lapse before a notice is sent out on overdue books. The library usually sends out a bill any time from six weeks to three months or

often worked only 15 hours a week because of the way the shifts were scheduled. Bul they were paid on a salary basis, and had certain fringe benefits, such as having their unemployment insurance con-tributions paid for. They belleve they were and are fulltime employees and should receive benefits as such.

Mrs. Cornwell sald the question was drawn to her attention by a staff member who had worked for the Acton library for 25 years, and was asking for the benefits accorded to a town slaff member with that

seniority. She was inquiring particul-arly about the five weeks vacation for senior lown staff. The decision would also affect such matters as sick leave. Board member Ruth Wilson

sald, "If the library is open 24 hours a week, then in my opinion, that's full-lime". Board member Betty Fisher asked what the present policy for such cases was, and Mrs. cornwell said that at the pres-

ent there is no policy. "I personally would think we should treat them as full-time employees", board chairman Dick Howitt sald. He added that in the case of employees of the various components of Halion Hills, they carried over their seniority to their job with Halton Hills.

The board voted to allow the three staff members involved to receive the benefits of fulltime staff members.
