College renovations set

The Sheridan College Port Street campus in Mississauga is undergoing renovations to accommodate new skill-training programs, sponsored by Canada Manpower, college president Jack Porter announced last week.

Mr. Porter said the addition of 10,000 square feet will include two classrooms and two shops. The new programs, which will begin in October, are Welder Fitter, Machine Shop and Blue Print Reading. Drafting will be offered at the Oakville Campus for the first time, starting in September.

The new facilities could be tied in with the new training scheme announced by Minister of Colleges and Universities Harry Parrott last June to meet the current shortage of skilled workers.

Dean of Community Services Don Hamilton said the provincial scheme fits in with steps the college has already taken in that direction. The Halton-Peel Educational Liaison Committee has established

a sub-committee to look into the need for a co-ordinated skill training program in the technical area.

The committee will be bringing out a report in November on what the college could do in co-operation with the local high schools.

Mr. Hamilton said he sees the setting up of broadly-based committees to assess local needs and suggest programs to meet them as a logical step.

When Mr. Parrott announced the provincial program in June, he said its aim would be

to expand current apprenticeship programs. However, the program will also include a new scheme called employer-sponsored training.

This program would use federal funds to sponsor training programs developed by local industrial training committees representing labor, government, offices of the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission and educators.

"We have already begun to sound out key people as representatives for our own industrial committee which will

suggest projects to fit in under the new provincial plan," Mr. Hamilton said.

The new technical training courses are an addition to the business and commerce and academic courses already offered through Community Services and sponsored by Canada Manpower.

Divide, conquer program 'a hit'

Elated at the success of Halton Hills' "divide and conquer" garbage separation program, Halton Hills council has added the name of this municipality to a petition aimed at encouraging the use of refundable, mandatory deposit soft drink containers.

The resolution appeals to the provincial government to provide individual municipalities with the legal authority to establish mandatory deposits and to create a province-wide mandatory deposit system.

Council last week simultaneously received an update report on the divide and conquer program and a resolution being circulated by the regional

municipality of Waterloo. The resolution notes that Halton Hills has made "great advances" in reducing garbage output

through its divide and conquer program and should now try and help other municipalities persuade the government province to take further action.

The Waterloo region resolution points out that refillable glass soft drink containers have been shown to be "markedly preferable" to non-refillable metal and glass containers since the former results in a net increase in jobs, conserves energy and mater-

ials, reduces solid waste and litter and saves tax money. A refundable, mandatory deposit system, the resolution predicts, would result in a substantial increase in the use of refillables.

A report on Halton Hills' divide and conquer program informed council that in its first 12 weeks of operation, the program witnessed about 25 per cent of the 4,731 serviced Georgetown households taking part in the garbage separation plan.

A total of 134.73 tons of material was collected for recycling, of which newspaper made up 69 per cent of the total volume by weight, glass 21 per cent and metal 10 per cent.

A 10 per cent decline in total tonnage was recorded in the second six-week period, the report states, probably due to the holiday season.

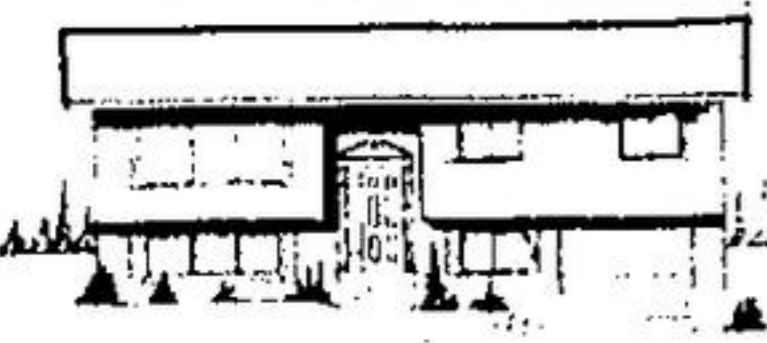
