Chrysler now in first, lead Harley by a game

For the first time in many weeks Harley Motors is not on. top of the Georgetown Industrial League standings. Georgetown Chrysler, who have been chasing Harley all year, finally took over first place by winning all five of their games in the last two

weeks. Harley has won two, and tied two while losing only one in the same period of time, but that was not good enough to hold onto first place.

The battle for first place seems to be exclusively between those two clubs and both have seven games remaining

to play. The battle for third place is by no means settled with six clubs conceivingly still having a shot at it. Rexway Towing missed a chance to solidify its third place standing by losing to Limehouse on Monday

One team on the move is Hornby. They won two of their three games last week and have moved into sole possession of fourth place.

The team on the skids is Royal Trust. They dropped all three of their games last week and have slipped to eighth place after being in third for most of the year. They still have an eight-point lead over Fobert's Flyers for the final playoff spot and one game in

There should be fireworks at the fairgrounds tonight when Chrysler and Harley meet at 6:30 p.m. on Diamond C.

The difference between the two teams is that Chrysler has come out on top in their two previous meetings.

at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, upstairs in the recreation offices. The testing will go on from 10 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday and from 10 a.m. to B:30 p.m. Thursday.

The test itself lasts 45 minutes, and is followed by a 15-minute counselling session. The cost is \$12. Members of the Filness Van team are urging people to register as soon as possible to ensure they can take the test when they want to take it.

The Fitness Van Project is being sponsored by the Greater Hamilton-Burlington YMCA and the ministry of culture and recreation. There are seven fitness vans travelling in Ontario as part of a program to promote physical fitness in Ontario.

The fitness test consists of

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The activities include a step test in which the subject steps up and down a 20-cm, slep to the beat of music, the speed of the beat being determined by the age and sex of the subject; deep breathing to study the capacity of the lungs; sit-andreach exercises to study flexibility: measures of hand-grip strength and measurement of all-over body fat.

Information on fitness among Canadians is included in the brochure describing the Filness Van project, According to the brochure, 40 per cent of Canadians watch more than 15 hours of television a week, and 13 per cent watch more than 30 hours. The brochure also includes

fitness statistics. It says only 20 per cent of Canada's popula-

tion is active in any form of physical activity, and less than 15 per cent of Canada's adult population meets internationally accepted standards of

physical fitness. "The individual who has been kidding himself he is physically fit will be in for a sad disappointment," those who attended the press conference announcing the beginning of the Fitness Van project were told, "Most people who take the test will fall short of being physically fit, but with the counselling of one of our professionals they will receive an exercise prescription that will put an individual on the road towards physical fit-

Anyone interested in registering for the fitness tests can call the recreation department at 877-5185, and ask for extension 60.

"As far as registration is concerned, the sooner the better," assessor-counsellor Arlene Rolko said.








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
