Burial costs go up, fees hiked

It will cost residents and non-residents alike more to be buried at Halton Hills' two main cemeteries if a recommendation endorsed by the town finance and administration committee Monday is accepted next week by council. In what would be the first rate increase since December, 1974, the cost of plots at

False alarms reported

Fire calls around Halton Hills during the past week produced little damage. Georgetown volunteers were called to a malicious false alarm on Guelph Street Wed-

nesday, and a supposed barn fire Monday on the Sixth Line, and 15 Sideroad that turned out to be garbage burning. They were also called to a Maple Avenue home Saturday when smoke began pouring from the oven of a kitchen

stove. It wasn't serious, however, just unnoticed food left in the oven that began to smoke when the oven was turned on. Acton volunteers were called to a grass fire near the

cemetery Saturday but again there was no damage. The area's only serious fire occured at 3:45 a.m. Friday in a bedroom of a Main Street residence in Georgetown. The

blaze did \$600 damage.

Fairview Cemetery in Acton and Greenwood Cemetery in Georgelown is scheduled to rise to \$115 from \$90 for adult residents of the town, and to \$144 from \$112.50 for non-resi-

Children's plots would similarly increase in cost from \$25.40 and \$33 to \$55 and \$68.75. Interment charges are also recommended for a rate hike, rising to \$100 from \$60 for residents, to \$125 from \$75 for

non-residents, to \$50 from \$36

for resident children and to

\$65.50 from \$45 for non-resident children. The committee has recom mended that space be made available for the first time at the cemeterie: for the burtal of cremated remains. The cost of two foot by two foot plots would he \$30 for residents and \$35 for non-residents.

Town treasurer Ray King reported that Halton Hills' rates for the sale of plots are lower than those of many neighboring municipalities. In the town's 1978 budget, he pointed out, total expenditures for both cemeteries amounted to \$48,570, compared to \$32,700 In revenue collected.

"The introduction of the proposed rates will not entirely cover the total costs of operating the two cemeterles," he cautioned. "It will, however, ensure that interment costs are met entirely from revenue recleved and that additional revenue will be available from the sale of plots to meet normal maintenance costs."

\$5 million forecast before town council

Road reconstruction projects dominate a \$5,802,000 our-year capital forecast endersed by the Halton Hills finance and administration committee Monday.

Town treasurer Ray King stressed that the forecast, which the committee turned over to public works for further consideration, has been prepared solely to assist the current and future councils plan budgets for the years 1979 through 1982.

Figures contained in the forecast are not binding, he said, but are subject to extensive revision as priorities are arranged and financing is debated.

Road reconstruction projects tentatively slated for he next four years represent a gross cost of \$3,205,000, from which tax levies and subsidies must be deducted.

Roads being considered for upgrading or storm sewer work during 1979 include Main Street South, Churchill Crescent, Bard Lane and Charles Street in Ward 3, and Lakeview Road, River Road, Maple Avenue and the First Line elsewhere in the municipality.

Also included in the 1979 forecast is the replacement or purchase of three firefighting vehicles, a computer system update, erosion control in Metcalfe ravine and on Armstrong Avenue, the construction of a new roadway and bridge in Cedarvale Park, the development of two soccer pitches in

the Georgetown fairgrounds and the relocation of the fairgrounds baseball diamonds at Gordon Alcott arena.

The total gross forecast for 1979 is \$2,062,000, which would be reduced by a \$959,500 tax levy and a \$771,500 subsidy. Mr. King also anticipates the recovery of a further \$331,000, oringing the total cost down to \$192,000.

MOH denies polio cases reported

Halton's Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Joseph Chamberlain, denied Tuesday that there was any truth in a radio report of three cases of polio in Oakville,

Dr. Chamberlain says he understands there are members of three separate families who have placed themselves under voluntary quarantine because they have had contact with recent polio cases.

Results of one group or tests show no indications of polio being present in these people, and results from another test is not yet available from the laboratory, he says.


Dr. Chamberlain feels that there is very little likelihood of these people contracting the disease since their contact with the confirmed cases was
