Two months of training paid off well for Halton Hills swimmers in a pair of meets this past week.

Thursday, the team finished third in a field of six teams at the Kelly's Cup Invitational meet in Ancaster. The meet was won by a strong CASA development team from Hamilton-Wentworth, Caledonia, Fairfield, Grimsby and Ancaster also took part in the meet.

On Saturday at the Central Region Championships the local team placed a respectable fourth in a nine-team meet, held at David Ramsay Pool in Mississauga. The host club took first place by a long margin.

There are some excellent swimmers in the Halton Hills club and one of the big benefactors has been Georgetown district high school.

Club members Beth Stewart, Eric Elson, Mary Lynn Morrow, Kim MacLeod and Andrea Stapleton all swam on the high school team last season. Elson, Morrow and Stewart won the Halton championships and competed in the OFSAA meet in Guelph.

Jenny Thompson, who along with Heather Clarke coaches the team, says there are quite a few good prospects who should go on to become competitive high school swimmers. "When pressed for names Thompson says that," Don Elson, Cheryl Thompson, James Bydevaate and Actonites Heather Thatcher and Heather Michie could do well in high school.

"There are also other swimmers who show a lot of promise and this program is helping," Thompson added. "For example Jennifer Lusby never swam competitively before June and she showed well at the two meets".

Ontario Outdoors

Don't forget the Photo Contest sponsored by the Halton Region Conservation Authority and the one by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.
It is the chance to show everyone just how good you are with that camera of yours.
The Canada Centre for Inland Waters states the water levels in Lake Erie and Ontario dropped in July while the levels in Superior and Huron rose. Even wet weather for the next five months (August through December) will not bring the levels up to where they were last year in December.
This may have an effect on the fishing, as some of the shoals for spawning will be exposed.
Well, it has happened, the saying among the sportsmen of Ontario has been "Miller will be replaced, he is just too good" and they sure hit it right. At the time of writing this column, no replacement has been declared, but you can bet it is someone that will not co-operate with the sportsmen the way Frank S. Miller did.
Mr. Miller replaces Darcy McKeough as minister of treasury and economics, and while in the office of minister of natural resources he was respected.
Happenings on the Credit: as promised, details on the opening of the Credit River to fall fishing for SALMON. An experimental program will open small portions of the lower river to fishermen for Rainbow, Brown Trout and Salmon, but will close again if the privilege is abused.

ELDORADA PARK and CHURCHVILLE PARK in Brampton; MEADOWVALE CONSERVATION AREA, STJEETSVILLE PARK, ERINDALE PARK and parks at the mouth of the Credit will be accessible for fishing. Brochures outlining these areas are available at the offices of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority and some local sporting goods stores.
I am trying to get some myself so call me at 877-0173 or 877-9290. AUG. 13, 1968, the Huttonville Dam went out. Just one of the good things that happen on the Credit. It opened the way for the fish to get upriver, and now they are stopped only by the dam at Norval. This is a very sensitive area, and is private. However, you may fish the south side of the old iron bridge, but please remember to pick up after yourself as well as others or this privilege will be taken away.
Lots of activities for the fall months (they are just about there), starting with "Corn Cob Capers" at Mounsbury Wildlife Centre. Any weekend between Aug. 26th and Sept. 24th, 10 a.m. till 5 p.m. Fresh CORN, hot dogs etc. will be available along with free samples of fresh squeezed apple cider, done on the spot. Lots of other activities, including horse drawn wagon rides.
A James Bay Cree Indian, Gabriel Spence, has taken over operation of the goose hunting camp at Attawapiskat. The ministry of natural resources have transferred ownership of the goose camps to the native peoples in order to have them become more self-sufficient.
With the thoughts of hunting, here are a few hints on keeping warm in the winter. Of major importance is carrying waterproof matches.
The long hairy LICHEN called "old mans beard" makes good fire starting material and hangs from mature conifers, thus keeping relatively dry. Dead, standing trees make the best fire wood, although beaver peeled poplar washed up on beaches is great for a hot quick fire.
It is obvious that you should learn to identify trees and wood in general, and you will quickly learn that Tamarack is very hard and can deflect the blow of an axe, but makes an excellent, long burning firewood.
As for warming the insides, tea is the recognized drink of the north country, maybe there is something to that.
