Basic service for rural customers in the Georgetown "477" exchange will be improved as of Nov. 7 when Bell Canada's \$800,000 non urban service improvement (NUSI) program in the exchange is completed.

Subscribers outside the base rate area who already have one or two-party service will have their mileage rates go up by 50 per cent per quarter mile. Those customers with four-party service will pay \$1.40 a month instead of \$1 for an eight or ten party line.
