# UWC brief gets action daily phys ed promised

Halton elementary schools will be directed by the board of education to provide a minitoum of three 30-minute periods of instruction in phy-

sical education. The directive is in response to a brief on physical education from the Georgelown University's Women's Club (UWC) which recommended 30-60 minutes of physical education a day.

The UWC has also recommended that each school should have "quality physical education personnel" either within the school or acting in a consultant capacity, and that the board should undertake a public education prograin to make the public aware of the value of daily physical exercise.

The executive committee of the board says it is not realistic to expect 30-60 minutes of physical education daily, because it would likely mean the sacrifice of time for other areas of the core curriculum, and the teachers are not sufficiently familiar with the core curriculum to accomplish this goal.

The executive committee pointed out, however, that the core curriculum calls for a minimum of three 30-min-

ute periods of physical education a week, and in 60 per cent of Halton's elementary schools, this goal is not being met, E.S. Lavender, the director of education, said the administration will direct the schools to fall in line with this minimum requirement.

The executive committee reported that the recommendation concerning supervision by quality physical

education personnel was desireable, but unrealistic. However, the committee said it hopes the board can meet the spirit of the recommend-

Bruce Mather, superintendent of program, said it is hoped eventually that Halton will move toward daily physical education classes, and said that could come in the 1978-80 school year.

# Inmont Presstite expanding

A legal agreement prepared by the town of Halton Hills has been placed in the hands of officials at Inmont Presstite Ltd., where plans for a 5,000square foot expansion to the plastic and scalant producing factory are being finalized.

According to the agreement, the town has extended its option to purchase an acre of land adjacent to the Armstrong Avenue, Georgetown, plant where the company wants to move its employee parking lot once the extension encroaches upon an existing

The agreement was initially

drawn up and approved by both the town and the company in September, 1968. Inmont is bound by the revised agreement to commence construction on the extension or on a new facility at the site before September, 1979, and should complete the work before September, 1980. Failure to meet the proposed schedule would empower the town to purchase the vacant lot from the comp-

The town will also seek financial reimbursement for any legal fees involved in the preparation and signing of the G. H. Ward & Partners Chartered Accountants

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
