Local boy, 14, already a pinball wizard

Herald staff writer Many university and high , school students complain there are no summer jobs for students: and then there's Mark Edwards, who, at the age of 14, holds down four part-time jobs and owns a pinball machine and a jukebox.

Mark, who will be entering grade ten at Georgetown District High School next week, works part-time at C and S Printing, helps deliver mail on a rural route, works at the

Arcade, a pinball gallery on Mill Street, and babysits for neighbors.

Between these activities, Mark manages to fit in sufficient spare time for some bowling, television and sufficient practice at pinball to place second in two tournaments.

Delivering mail every morning is Mark's regular summer job. He is the passenger who buts the mail in the boxes. In his job at C and S Printing, he goes in for two and a half days

a month to cellate magazine pages and staple them togeth-

Mark has been working at the Arcade for three years, making change, and supervising the players, enforcing the rules about smoking and shaking the machines.

Mark has been involved in buying and selling jukeboxes and pinball machines for about three years. Presently, he owns the Jukebox in Kentner's Dairy Bar and one pinball

began buying and selling pinball machines. "I fixed them up in my garage, and then I put two on location in Glen Willlams, and sold them at a profit". Mark put the third machine in the Sportsman's Bowl on

machine in the Arcade.

"About three years ago, my

father lent me \$300 and I went

to Woodbridge and bought

three baseball machines,"

Mark said in explaining how he

Mark's next venture involved getting a loan from a bank, which he used to purchase a two-player pinball machine from his father. Mark's father, Dan Edwards, owns the Arcade, and works for George-

Mill Street, and later sold it in

an auction in Ballinafad. With

the proceeds from the sale, he

repaid the loan from his fath-

town Hydro. Mark put the machine in the

Areade for a time and later sold it to a man who wanted it

for his home. Following the sale of the pinball machine, Mark went into partnership with his sister Anna, who was trying to raise money for a school trip to Germany. The two bought a jukebox which had been located in Kentner's Dairy Bar, and moved it into the Arcade.

Mark later sold his half of the inkelox to his father and with the proceeds and another bank loan, bought another jukebox, which is presently located in the dairy bar.

Mark also bought two more pinball machines, and sold them to people for their homes. White attending a pinball school at Curries' in Milton to learn how to repair the new electronic solid-state games, he met a man who owns a pinball arcade in Waterloo. Mark bought a machine from

him and put it in the Arcade. Mark said he fearned what he knows about repairing pinball machines from watching his father working on them at the Arcade, Mr. Edwards bought his first pinball machine in 1958. He has owned the Arcade since the late 1960's, he

Some people may think of pinhall machines and jukeboxes as toys, but they are not cheap. Even the older model pinball machines on safe in Toronto cost about \$495, Mark said. Newer machines cost about \$1,000. The new solidstate games cost between

\$2,500 and \$3,000. New jukehoxes can cost as much as \$2,000, and often look more like a stereo than what most people would visualize. Mark said he buys new records for his jukebox himself, and replaces the records once or

Mark has no definite plans for another venture in the immediate future. He would like to attend a two-day seminar being held by Curries' on the new solid-state machines, which Mr. Edwards said are much more complicated and suphisticated than the machines on the market now. So far, there are only two or three models, each of which is

designed for four players.

"Once I get this machine paid off, I might buy an electronic geme," Mark said. "And my dad said he might eventually sell me the Arc-

But pinbali machines and jukeboxes will probably remain more or less a hobby with Mark, as with his father. When asked what he wanted to do when he is finished school, Mark said he wasn't sure.

"I might become an accoun-

At the preliminary hearing, evidence will be heard, Mr. Bilodeau will be asked to register a plea, and a decision will be made as to how the case will be tried.


