Ten players cut by Inglis after second Raider practise

Georgetown Raider coach Gerry Inglis trimmed his roster by 10 after last Thursday night's two-hour practise. It was the second practise for the team this year.

Gone are two goaltenders, four defencemen and four forwards.

The goaltenders gone are Dave Weiss and Tony Drewitt. Weiss is still eligible to play junior. The departure of the two means incumbents Gregg Hooper and Mario MacDonald plus newcomer Bill Masters will compete for the two jobs.

The Raiders may of course bring in more goaltenders as the season opener draws closer.

MacDonald was not at Thursday's practise because of work commitments. Hooper looked very good during the workout and Masters held his own.

The four defencemen no longer with the squad are Paul Richard, Dave Connelly, Steve Merritt and Doug Pemberton. A possible surprise there is Richard who played with the

Mississauga Senior "A" team last year.

Even with the four defencemen gone there is still an abundance of blueliners. There is also plenty of talent at that position.

Brian McBratney, who played with Flint, Michigan in the International League last year and Gary Barden, who put in a couple of years with the Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds, were the new defencemen at the Thursday practise. Both of them looked imposing to say the least.

If the Raiders decide to keep McBratney, Barden and Doug Edwards there certainly will not be any lack of size among the defensive corps. All three big men are also very mobile.

Also trying for a spot on the defense are holdovers from last year, Bill Currie, who played part of the season, Brad Butterworth, Neil Cotton, John Boyce and Bob Elinesky.

Barry Carroll, who also played with the Mississauga team last year, is also a defenceman and has a fair chance of making the team.

Inglis is going to have to make some tough decisions before he gets down to five or six defencemen. McBratney was the stickout at Thursday's practise, but Elinesky and Boyce, who both reported in top shape, were also looking good.

The four forwards who will not be Raiders this year are Dave Norton, Brian Hurley, Peter Burgess and Herb Cowan.

Inglis still has a little intricate surgery to do however, before the final forwards are chosen.

Sure bets to make the team are Juri Kudrasovs, Steve Blundy, and Ray Evans from last year's team. Newcomers Steve Norris and Terry Porter are looking very good in the practises and should make the

squad. Raiders from previous years who were not there at the completion of last year, Ray Tonelli, Colin Gordon and Pat Maloney, should also be Raiders this year.

If the players mentioned above do make the team that would fill eight forward positions and leave openings for only two, three or at the most four more. Among the players trying out for those remaining positions are Chris Milne, Doug Barnes and Bobby Fotheringham. All three have played some good hockey in Georgetown in previous years.

There was also an interesting spectator at the Thursday practise, Doug Ford, who has played several seasons in the International League, was checking things out and rumor has it he will be in a Raider uniform before too long. He is apparently an excellent goal scorer and playmaker and could push someone out of a spot on the roster.

Veterans Art Webster, Tom Daley, Tom Gilbert and Doug Tate will in all likelihood not be back with the team. A couple of them were expected to be at Thursday's practise but did not make an appearance.

Another player who would be difficult to keep out of the lineup is Archie Chase, who also played with the Mississauga team. However, Chase will be attending Waterloo University and may not be able to play with the Raiders if he chooses to play hockey at school.

The stickouts at the Thursday session were Porter and Novis. Both played for Newmarket in tier two junior "A" last year. Porter has excellent speed and moves and a hard shot. Novis is big and strong and can handle the puck. They could be the answers to all the young legs on the Dundas Merchant team.

Girls soccer bantams win three

In the half line Andy Stapleton, Kamelle Jones and Kathleen Torswick led by Jeanne Wilson at the centre, were responsible for most of the play held in the opponent's half as they literally shut off many goal scoring threats.

The offense led by captain Crossman, Elaine Wilson, Smith, Penny Bydevaate and Lynne Cunningham finally

came into their own, noticeable crisp passing, proper ball control and positional play. Altogether between themselves they are responsible for over twenty goals in the past five games with three against.
