By R.C. (BOB) OLLIVIER FALL is more than cooler weather, it heralds the closing of the various fishing seasons. The earliest is Lanark and Frontenac areas for Lake Trout and Splake on September 8, and the regular trout season here on September 30th.

Generally the Bass season closes on November 30 along with some Muskie, and an eye on the regulations is recommended for complete details. I have said it many times and it bears repeating, a Fisherman should never be without a copy of the summary of the fishing regulations provided by the M.N.R.

With all the Fall Fairs around, there is sure to be something for the outdoorsman, and Black Creek Pioneer Village often provides that extra.

More than that place though is Cold Creek Conservation Area between Bolton and Nobleton along the King Side Road. The various programs provide auctions, demonstrations and lots of family fun.

Sunday, September 10, 11 am to 3 pm the Upper Canada Rifles will provide black powder action along with Hand Gun drill work. The Credit Valley Conservation Authority fall schedule is Belfountain open till Thanksgiving, Meadowvale closes Sept. 5, Monora closed Sept. 5, Orangeville closes Thanksgiving, Terra Cotta also closes on Sept. 5 with the exception of weekend camping till the

Even at this range, a close and regular eye on the weather is important. Surface action of huge fish does not mean they are hitting, they just seem to "play" on the surface, and these fish seldom if ever take a lure, just don't waste your time on them.

Get down to where the water is more comfortable to the fish and try to anger them into striking. Don't forget, as the fish head up the rivers, the flesh immediately starts to deteriorate and each one should be checked for edibility. 
