Election fever is breaking out in Halton Hills as a third candidate announced this week that he intends to seek a municipal council seat for Ward 3 on Nov. 13.

John McDonald, 31, has been a life-long resident of Halton Hills and is concerned with the community's future since he lives in Georgetown and also works as personnel manager at DRG Stationery Company.

Mr. McDonald hopes that voters will come to know that while he does appreciate local history and is vice-president of the Esquesing Historical Society, he is also aware of the present and does "think 1978".

Lack of rental accommodation both for family residences and for overnight visitors points to lack of planning in the community Mr. McDonald

"I can't say how many families I've talked to whose children have grown up, married and left town because they couldn't find an apartment or a house to rent here," he says.

"And hotel-motel accommodation isn't adequate either. We have a lot of out-of-town. out-of-province and even out-of

-country visitors at work and we have to take them down to the airport hotels because there isn't anything suitable here. It could be a lucrative business here if someone would take it on. Past and present planning just doesn't seem to be good enough in that

respect". Mr. McDonald is also concerned at the number of vacant industrial properties in Georgetown.

"We have an industrial committee I understand," he says, "but we don't hear what they're doing. All we get is the bad P.R. (public relations) over Focal.

The question of Focal Properties and the proposed development south of Silver Creek is not something he is prepared to comment on at this point since he is still investigating it.

Mr. McDonald is also interested in and supportive of plans to renovate downtown Georgetown. He feels there are a lot of provincial and federal grants available to help with the project.

Seeing the "eyesore" along the creek which runs from Mill Street, across Guelph and

down to Maple Avenue cleaned up is another matter he feels council could tackle at very little cost.

"Citizens would enjoy a park or walk ways along the creek", he says, "and it would add to the attractivness of the downtown. I understand the CVCA (Credit Valley Conservation Authority) would be willing to work with the town on doing something with it. It wouldn't
