BOOK REVIEW

Living in a pleasant country

Canadians are sometimes overly modest about their country, as though they needed someone from outside to reassure them that they were indeed living in a pleasant land and doing passably well.

A New Kind Of Country, by Dorothy Gilman (Doubleday: 192 pages; \$7.95) is a book that will not merely reinforce a Canadian's belief in his own land, but may make many Americans wish that they could be part of our commun-

This is not tourist brochure. Near the beginning, the American author says: "It was a country I'd never visited before. It was this that was foreign, not my surroundings. And it was frightening".

East Tumbril is the code name for the small town where she bought her house and come to know the lobstermen of Nova Scotia. She came to know the people who lived there.

the newest". SELF-DISCOVERY There is much self-revelation going on these days, on television and on the printed page. A good deal of it is somewhat startling in a vulgar

This, too, is a book of self-exploration - but most readers will, I predict, feel there are companions in the exploration rather than mere

on-lookers. There are nice quiet bits like this: "When we first visited East Tumbril, my son Jonathan said, 'Have you noticed the way everybody talks about the weather? You'd think there

was nothing else to talk about'. "Well, in a way there wasn't. The weather was THERE, an integral part of life, elemental, unpredictable and always, ALWAYS dramatic. I could leave for town in a thick fog, reach Tumbril Centre to find the sun shining, and drive through a snowstorm before I reached town.

"When the sun shone it was dazzling; when there was fog it was wraithlike and pearly, drifting past one's windows or sometimes following one up from the beach when it moved in fast; and then of course there was the wind.

"At I grew immersed in country life, I took, began every conversation with speculations about the weather; what else was more import-

"Even today I remain uneasy if the day ends without a complicated weather report and a complete marine foreeast; I remain eternally braced for the unexpected now, which in East Tumbril was the

. And then, a page later, she says "We are born alone and we die alone. . . we'd better learn how to handle aloneness and solitude".

ALWAYS ON CALL Later on she seems to recognize the difficulty of the thesis she has laid down.

"It's hard to separate oneself and stand alone: For a cause, for a belief, for a purpose, even to try something new. And for women the ryles are little more complicated than for men.

"It's hard enough PHYSICALLY for a woman to continue being a teacher or physicist after she's had a child, but emotionally, it's hardest of all: She runs the intolerable risks of being called not independent but selfish, or, most biting of all, mascu-

"We move from guilt to guilt, damned if we do, and damned if we don't."

The book is perhaps at its best when Dorothy Gilman is simply describing her life in the small Nova Scotia village but is made fuller and more meaningful by her reflections on the state of man. A reader may disagree with some of her thoughts but will not lightly dismiss them.

This is Dorothy Gilman's first non-novel. I hope she will do another before too long. Richard Gordon L. Gordon's latest novel, You'll Hear Me
