Canfarm a loss to farmers, MP urges saving

.The federal government's plans to eliminate Canfarm, a federal agricultural services agency, will be a blow to Canadian farmers and should be scrapped, Conservative MP Perrin Beatty said.

Mr. Beatty, representative for the riding of Wellington-Grey-Dufferin-Waterloo, said farmers were not given the opportunity to make their opinions on the matter known before Treasury Board President Robert Andras decided to eliminate Canfarm as part of

them. The government owes it to our farmers and to the employees who will be left jobless if Canfarm is cancelled to make every effort to find a private buyer," Mr. Beatty




