You should obtain your **Mitigated Game Bird Hunting Permit** now, just in case the post office goes on strike. The regular hunting licence is available as is the 1978 Summary of the Hunting Regulations.

A much overlooked area for duck hunting is the Key Harbour area of Georgian Bay. In fact any of the bay areas of the Thirty Thousand Islands. Duck season opens there on Sept. 13, same as here, but the Goose Hunting Season opens on the 13th also and we must wait until the 16th of October to hunt geese here.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: Each hunter is responsible for identifying before shooting. With this in mind I have arranged for Bruce Buckland of Cambridge District and Blair Dawson of Richmond Hill of the Ministry of Natural Resources to set up a display of duck wings, mounted ducks and slides. This presentation will be aired on my television program **Ontario Outdoors** on Cable TV Channel 4 on Sept. 20, Wednesday at 6 p.m. Please arrange for your hunting friends to tune in and watch this important show.

The **Darlington Waterfowl Day** news did not arrive in time for my deadline, but the attendance was down due to the rain in the Toronto area. There wasn't a drop of rain at Oshawa, but it rained so hard here that we thought it was all over southern Ontario.

Irv Cochrane, chairman of the event, told me the big winner was Pat Godin. The many activities centre around the coming hunting season with the main interest on the excellent duck hunting available in Ontario. Make sure you are well represented and well insured when hunting or any other activity in the outdoors field by joining the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, and the National Firearms Association. I have membership forms for both organizations and we recommend them heartily.

FISHING: Broonte and the Credit both HOT, but the boats were blown off the lake most days last week. Sea Otter out of Broonte had been taking limits on blue and white Flatsail. Many limits were taken out of the Credit area. One innovation came by accident, troll fast enough to spin the dodger occasionally. Another is the flash resulting from a worn or chipped dodger. Both ideas work on



occasion but not all the time so try various methods to get the fish hitting. Shore and pier fishing is good now and getting better, with fish being taken on spawn bags and miniature marshmallows. Long casts with a deep diving plug such as the Rapala Fat Rap Salmon Special should produce well especially in the fluorescent red colour.

I still have sets of the **Salmon Fishing Information** and these include all aspects of fishing for these exciting sports fish.
