Rebels are downed in overtime in first game of the season

The Georgetown football Rebels lost their season opener at home 20-19 in overtime to Perdue on Friday despite Jim Rountree's stalwart performance.

Rountree caught five passes and scored two touchdowns to lead the Rebel offense, but with time running out on the clock the defense allowed a long touchdown pass by Perdue which tied up the score.

Early in the game it appeared the Rebels were sure to win the game. On their first posttion after a Perdue fumble they drove the ball all the way down the field to score.

The big plays on the touchdown drive were two passes from quarterback Gord Miller to split end Rountree. On the touchdown player Miller threw the ball to Rountree along the line of scrimmage and the receiver ran the ball in for seven yards. The conversion attempt was missed.

For the first quarter and a half the Rebel defense allowed Perdue to drive, but came up with the big plays at the right time to keep Perdue from scoring. Al Bower snuffed out one Perdue drive when he intercepted near the goal line. Perdue did finally get on the

on the inside running game, but was vulnerable to passes and outside running. Perdue made the conversion

to go ahead 7-6 and the first half ended at that score. Neither offense was very effective in the third quarer and the score remained 7-6

heading into the final stanza. The Miller to Rountree combination connected again in the fourth quarter to put George-town ahead. The scoring pass covered 10 yards. The completion gave Rountree five catches and 95 yards for the day. This time the convert was good and the Rebels led 13-7 with less than three minutes left on the
