Only Milton and Halton Hills have races brewing for Mayor

Milton and Halton Hills appear thus far to be the only Halton municipalities where candidates will clash in a race for the mayoralty as part of the forthcoming municipal election.
While Halton Hills' first and current mayor, Tom Hill, faces off with rookie Coun. Pete Pomeroy for the town's top political seat, Milton Mayor Don Gordon is facing a similar challenge from his predecessor, Anne MacArthur.
Mrs. MacArthur, about 65 years old, was defeated in her 1978 bid for re-election as mayor of Milton, a post she had held since Halton region came into being in 1974. Earlier this year, however, town council appointed her to a vacant council seat in Milton's Ward 2.
ONCE AGAIN
In announcing her candidacy for the mayoralty once again, Coun. MacArthur this week criticized Mayor Gordon for his lack of leadership during the past two years. A former school teacher, and presently vice-chairman of the Niagara Escarpment Commission, she indicated that she had been hoping Mayor Gordon would be challenged by one of three other Milton councillors, who were considered top contenders for the job. The fact that Jim Kerr, Gord Krantz and Brad Clements have chosen not to enter the mayoralty race leaves the door open to a strong alternative candidate, Coun. MacArthur said.
Mayor Gordon, 51, returned Coun. MacArthur's charges of poor leadership, saying that under her guidance, Milton council accomplished little. He further questioned the ethics of her appointment to the Ward 2 seat following the last election.
Mayor Gordon is a 20-year resident of Milton but represented his neighbors and other constituents on Oakville town council when his ward was
