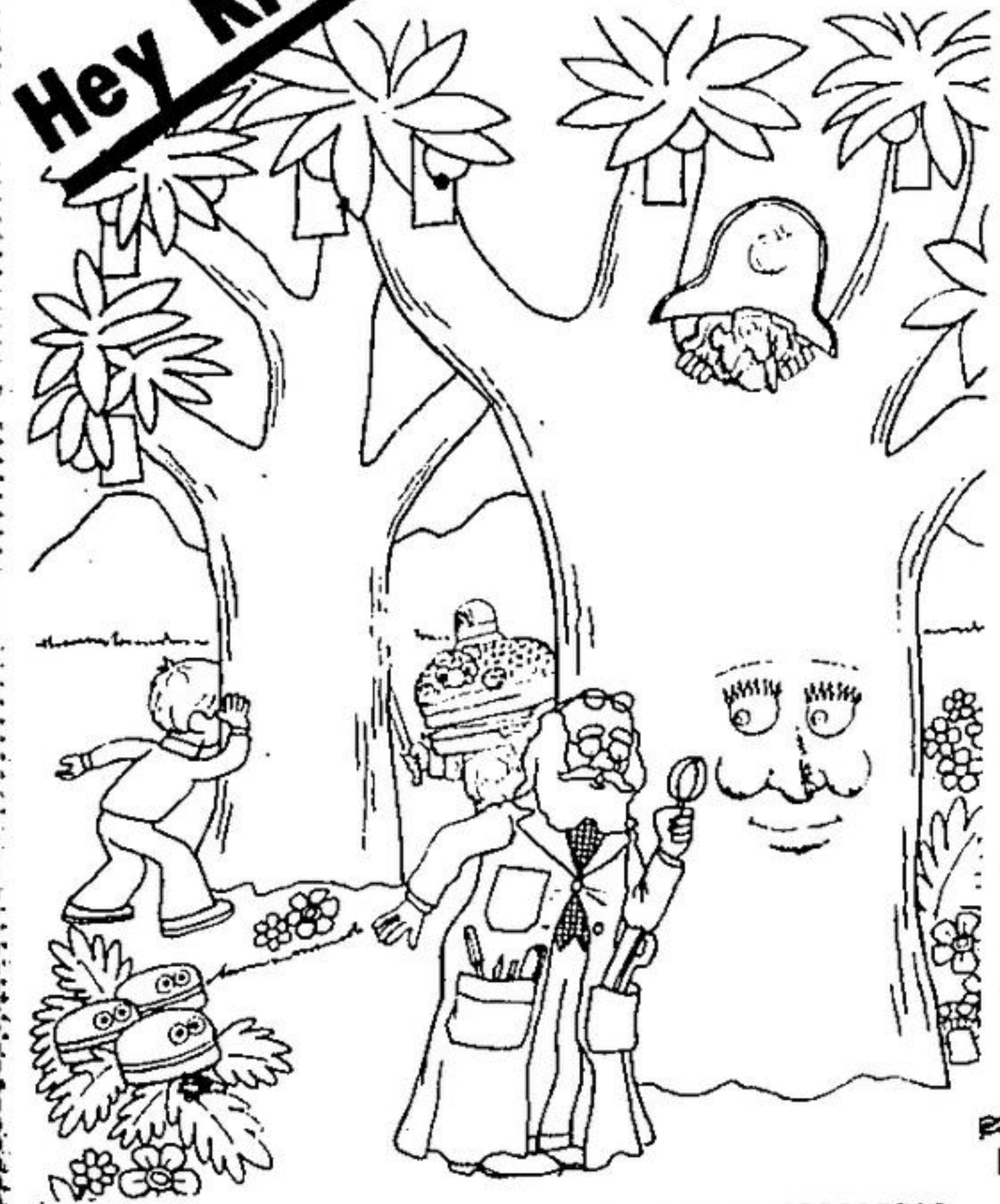

## Parenting courses may soon be offered

The Halton Board of Education will be asked tomorrow evening to consider the possibility of establishing courses in parenting education in its schools.

In a report by Howard Wrigglesworth principal Eric Balkind is suggested that teaching young adults the way a child develops as well as giving them practical experience in dealing with pre-schoolers would be a positive step in dealing with child abuse and all its attendant problems and expenses.

Mr. Balkind feels that declining enrollments are giving schools empty classrooms which could be turned into care and nursery centres for young children. Staffing these centres with students would give them a real opportunity to learn about very young children on a first hand basis. It would also keep down the cost of day care staff while giving many more facilities than what are presently available. Nor would there be a need to build accommodation for the centre if they were housed in an empty classroom.

In his report Mr. Balkind says that such a course should be introduced in the Grade 7 to 10 level since many students leave school at an early age. He would also recommend that the course be mandatory since anyone can become a parent no matter the financial, educational or maturity level.

The effect of the child's early years is something which too many people fail to realize, Mr. Balkind says, and teaching the prospective parent what will shape his child's future would do much both to avoid problems for those children and to decrease the number of future children coming into special education classes because of some type of problem begun in the home.

## Board appoints fact finder

The Education Relations Commission has appointed educator Grant Gillespie to examine the negotiations between the Halton Board of Education and its teachers.

A graduate of McMaster and the University of Toronto, Mr. Gillespie has been a teacher, a principal and a public school superintendent before becoming an education director for the Metro Toronto School Board.

Bill Priestner, chief negotiator for the board, says that a meeting between Mr. Gillespie and negotiators for both parties was scheduled for last night and reports stating all parties' positions are due in Mr. Gillespie's hands by Oct. 17.

Although the factfinder has been appointed to look at negotiations between the board and the elementary and secondary teachers, negotiations with the secondary teachers are continuing, Mr. Priestner said.

**HARD TO SAY**

"It's hard to say we had even reached an impasse with the elementary teachers," he said. "We just weren't making enough progress. When the factfinder was appointed to look at the elementary teachers' negotiations they put him on the secondary negotiations too."

Mr. Gillespie is expected to present a report within 30 days which will set forth the positions of both sides. It may or may not make recommendations. If agreement is not reached within 20 days of the report's presentation to both parties it will be made public.

## Harry Levy seeks seat

A third candidate for a local council seat in Ward 4 announced Monday that he intends to seek election Nov. 13.

## Cavan conflict continues

The monks of Halton Hills' Cistercian monastery, just south of Georgetown, may be interested to learn that Cavan township, northeast of Toronto where a municipal council voted against allowing them to settle in the area a year ago, was in the headlines again this week.

A janitor employed by the township refused to lower a flag outside municipal headquarters to half-mast to mark the death of Pope John Paul I, stating flatly that he would never so honor any Roman Catholic.

The all-Protestant township council, which apparently had nothing to do with the janitor's decision, came under fire last year when its members blocked an application by Cistercian monks from Okla. Abbey in Quebec to establish a new monastery there.

The small group of monks were ultimately welcomed warmly by members of Georgetown's French-Canadian community, and have established Canada's first French speaking monastery outside of Quebec on Main Street south.
