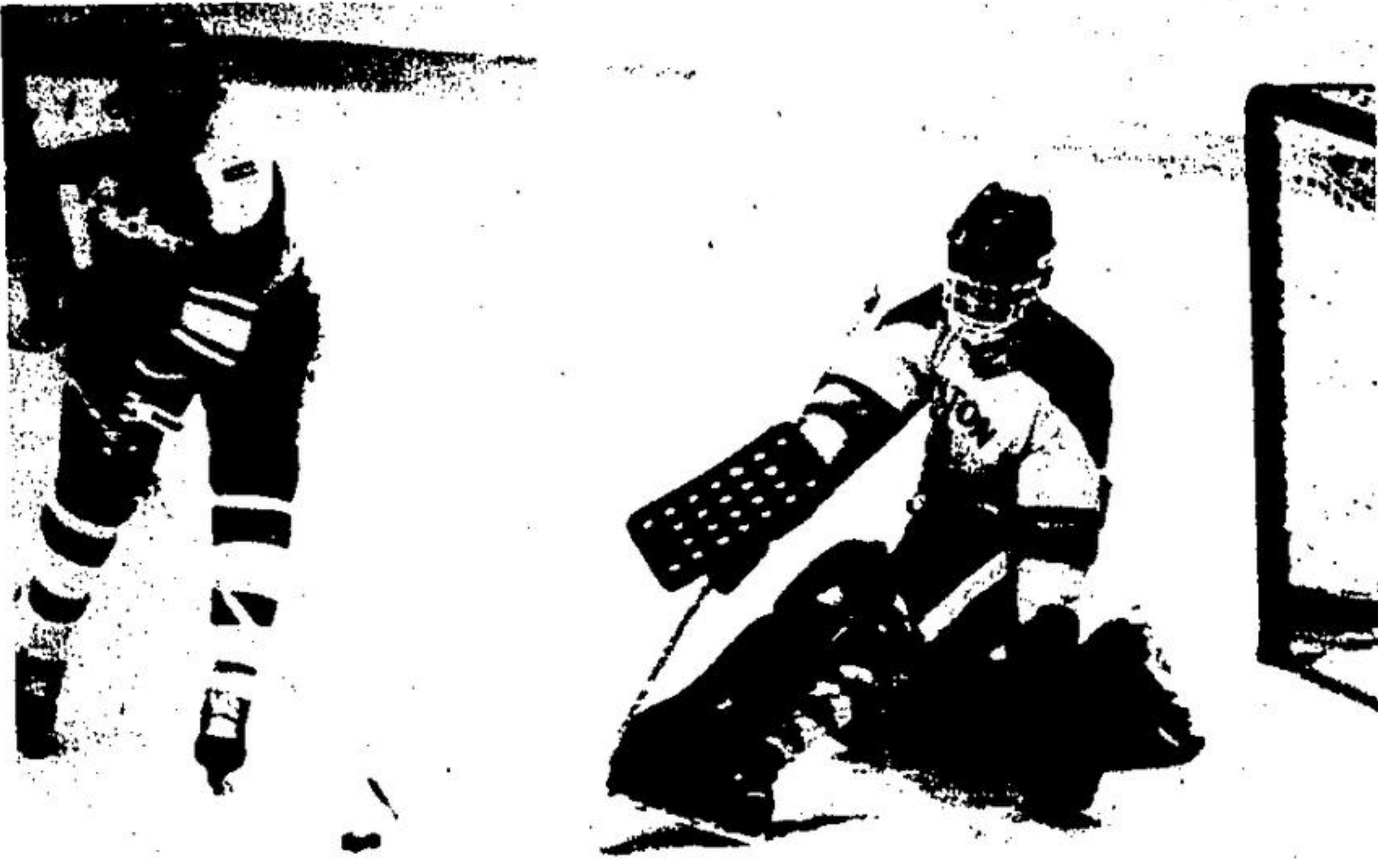


Milton no match for Raiders in exhibition game at Alcott

The Georgetown Raiders gave the Intermediate "B" Milton Tridents a hockey lesson by dominating them in a 9-4 exhibition win at Alcott Arena Friday night.

The Raiders swarmed all over the Tridents, who gave up both size and talent, and when all the shots were counted up the home side held a 53-37 edge.

Although the Raiders spent a good part of the first period playing short-handed they had the Tridents pinned in their own zone for much of the frame.

Defencemen Neil Colton opened the scoring for the Raiders when his low drive beat Bob Hiland during a power play. Juri Kudrasovs earned the assist on the goal.

Milton's Jim Robertson tied it for the visitors when he beat Peter McDuffe, who went all the way in the Raider net.

Less than a minute after the Milton goal Colin Gordon put the Raiders back in front with assists going to Steve Blundy and Ray Evans.

The Tridents scored on a power play as McDuffe was beaten by Keith McKinnon. The Tridents would have went ahead but a goal earlier was called back.

Steve Blundy, who has been a tower of strength so far for the Raiders during exhibition play, put the home side ahead for the third time in the game when he tallied from Terry Porter and Brian McBratney.

The second period belonged to the Raiders as they scored four times to turn the match into a rout. Georgetown outshot Milton 22-15 in that wide open second period.

Milton goaltender Terry Cole, who replaced Hiland at the half way point of the period, made a few sparkling saves to keep the Raider count down to four. All the Raider goals were scored in the first part of the period.

With only 14 seconds gone McBratney scored his first-ever goal as a Raider on an unassisted play.

The Raiders then scored three goals in two minutes and 32 seconds as they began to flex their muscle.

Ray Tonelli scored with goaltender McDuffe earning an assist on the play.

At the 9:21 mark of the frame Terry Porter and Colton set up Chris Milne for a goal. Just 26 seconds later Milne tallied again with Doug Barnes and Gary Barden earning the assists on that one.

Milton was kept off the score sheet in the second as many of their 15 shots were from long range.

Midway through the third period Tonelli fired a sizzling drive which easily beat Cole to put the Raiders up by six goals. It was an unassisted effort.

Evans scored with 6:31 left on the clock, from Tom Daley and Colton, who had a big offensive night, to give the Raiders a seven-goal bulge.

Late in the period the Tridents got goals from Lorne Lesuk and Gary Robertson to make the score respectable.

Richardson's goal with just 48 seconds remaining on the clock was scored with his team playing a man short.

The victory gave the Raiders a 3-0 mark in exhibition play as they had previously beaten the Whitby Ironquills and Barrie Flyers of the supposedly superior Senior "A" loop.

Last night the Raiders played a return match with the Tridents at Milton. It is a very safe bet the Raider mark is now 4-0.

Missing from the Raider lineup for Friday's match were defencemen Ron Fogal and Bill Currie, forwards Bob Fotheringham, Pat Maloney and Steve Novis as well as goaltender Mario MacDonald, who has yet to appear for the team in any games.

Defenceman Brad Butterworth and goaltender Gregg Hooper are not expected to be back with the team.

Butterworth, who was the team's most consistent blueliner last year, has apparently decided to play in the Georgetown Industrial League.

Of the five defencemen signed thus far only John Boyce and Cotton played the whole season with the Raiders last year. Currie spent only a portion of the schedule with the team.

Rumar has it that Hooper will still be the Intermediate "A" League. He is apparently after the number one goaltending job with the new Orangeville entry.

The Raiders open the season this Friday against the Fort Erie Mavericks only players signed to cards will be eligible to play the opener.

Coach Gerry Inglis and general manager Jack Handy were expected to sign at least a couple of more players after last night's game.

Expect Milne, who has been a standout throughout the pre-season schedule and goaltender Bill Masters to be signed and in uniform Friday. Masters is the only goaltender aside from McDuffe still with the team. MacDonald is signed, but heavy job commitments have kept him off the ice.

Masters, who attended the Detroit Red Wings rookie camp last year, has made two appearances so far.

He only was in for a couple of minutes before being injured in the win over Whitby.

Masters played for two periods against the Flyers and although he was still bothered by the sore shoulder he looked sharp.

The young goaltender was expected to be used for the whole game last night. If he made any kind of a showing he is now probably a signed Raider.

The team has signed five defencemen so far. They have Currie, Fogal, Cotton, McBratney and Boyce. There is only room on the squad for one more.

Apparently the Raiders asked Barden, who was the most aggressive player in red and white Friday night, to sign before he left the team a few weeks ago.

The rugged defenceman was back in uniform for Friday's game and was also expected to be dressed last night. It would come as absolutely no surprise if the Raiders signed him.

The only other defenceman still with the team is Bob

Elinesky. Elinesky has looked very good at practises and exhibition games, but apparently there have been no attempts to sign him to a card.

At last year's Raider dinner Elinesky and Butterworth were chosen as the team's most improved players. Could Butterworth's departure be an omen of things to come?

One thing is certain. The Raiders will have a new-look lineup when they skate on the ice to take on the Mavericks.

Back from last year will be Boyce, Evans, Daley, Blundy, Kudrasovs and Cotton. Gordon and Currie spent part of last Friday's game.

New to the lineup will be McDuffe, McBratney, Novis, Porter, Tonelli, Fogal and very possibly Barden and Masters.

So far it looks like the Raiders have signed a team which will be a strong contender for all the Intermediate "A" titles. Only time will tell.
