Ontario Outdoors

GUIDE TO EATING ONTARIO SPORT FISH, Great Lakes Region. The book is not particularly clear in the statistical district number one, Lake Ontario. It shows spottily with only COHO and "White" Bass tested in the CREDIT RIVER. However, taking the other areas as a standard Coho and Chinook should only be eaten occasionally in all sizes.

Even Brown Trout shows the same recommendation and Rainbow Trout was only tested in the Ganaraska River and from 12 inches up should only be eaten once or twice a week, or one pound per week.

Testing done in Lake Erie shows Rainbow Trout and Coho as completely safe.

Thornbury, Owen Sound, Nottawasaga Bay, Rainbow Trout are safe up to 25 inches. Salmon are now being taken in the Credit River below the Iron Bridge in NORVAL.

An important piece of news that missed the deadline for this column last week, is that the TROUT SEASON IS

DEFINITELY CLOSED in this area, and no extension was granted. I checked with the Ministry of Natural Resources (Cambridge Office) and that is the word.

Don't let anyone tell you otherwise.

BLUE FOX TACKLE is the name for the well known National Expe Bait Company, and is the distributor for PIXEE spoons. The new FOX-GLO version of the famous spoon used for taking Salmon and Trout contains a phosphorescent insert that looks a lot like an "egg sack".

This insert gives a coldlight glow that attracts fish. Pixee spoons come in five colours and nickle, brass, and copper hammered finishes. They sport genuine MUSTAD treble hooks and work at even the slowest retrieve.

I am currently testing a new hook arrangement for these lures and will report to the company with my findings. If anyone is going out on Lake Ontario soon, please call me and I will let you have a test lure to try out. Call me at 877-0173 or 877-9290.

The 1978 "Township" hunting licences are now available and they are limited in quantity, with only 200 non resident licences being issued.

I have a few copies of the booklet by the Canadian Wildlife Service, Ducks at a Glance. These are available on a first come basis, and there is no charge for these books, just call me and pick it up.

DaVinci exhibition

Halton-Peel - An exhibition of the work of Leonardo da Vinci - artist and scientist - will be held at the Oakville campus of Sheridan College, Oct. 3 to Oct. 20.

The exhibition is on loan from IBM Canada Ltd., and includes 25 models from his scientific and technical drawings. The models will be displayed in the Visual Arts department student lounge in A-wing, during regular school hours.

The general public and students of the college are invited to view the display and try some of the working models. Featured will be a triple-tiered machine gun, designs of two-level highways for pedestrian and vehicular traffic, and a device for determining tensile strength of wire.

The exhibition is designed to give a glimpse of da Vinci, the

engineer. From detailed sketches and drawings in his notebooks, working models of many of his inventions have been made. His creativeness and thirst for knowledge resulted in designs for inventions of the future that have to come to pass.
