Kudrasovs and McDuffe lead Raiders to victory

Juri Kudrasovs and Peter McDuffe took care of things at different ends of the rink to lead the Georgetown Raiders to a 6-1 win over the Port Colborne Sailors at Alcott Arena Friday night.

Kudrasovs sparked for the second consecutive game as he had several good scoring opportunities and set up numerous others for his linemates. The centreman scored twice and added an assist. In the team's first two games he has seven points.

Meanwhile at the other end of the ice, McDuffe was spectacular as the former National Hockey League frustrated the Sailor shooters time and again.

Mike Hominuk scored for the Sailors with just five minutes remaining on the clock to spoil McDuffe's shut-out bid.

For the second consecutive week the Raiders ran into a hot goaltender in the first period. Last week it was Fort Erie's Myles Bosnaek who held a hot hand in the first period and this week it was Rob Stewart of Port Colborne.

The Raider shooters fired 16 shots at Stewart in that first period and he was up to the task for each of them.

Again the Raiders overcame their scoring problems in the second period as this time they pumped five past Stewart, the same number they scored in the middle frame against the Mavericks last week.

Kudrasovs started things for the Raiders when he converted on a play set up by linemates Ray Tonelli and Colin Gordon.

That goal came with just one minute and 38 seconds gone on the clock.

With just over five minutes gone Terry Porter scored his first goal as a Raider when he rifled a wrist shot to the upper left hand corner. The assist on that goal went to Steve Novis and Chris Milne.

Gordon made it a 3-0 game when he tallied from Kudrasovs and Tonelli.

Ray Evans scored his fourth goal of the young season less than a minute after Gordon connected. Steve Blundy and Tom Daley earned the assists.

Kudrasovs scored his second goal of the game, and fifth of the year, with 2:40 remaining in the period. Evans and Tonelli were the playmakers on that one.

The Sailors got chippy in the final period and as a result a couple of fights took place.

One of the fights, between the Raiders' Porter and Jim Butters, proved to be costly for the Raiders. Defenseman John Boyce stepped into the altercation and as a result received a major misconduct which carries an automatic two-game suspension.

It means the Raiders have two defencemen out serving suspensions. Neil Cotton received four games for raising his stick in self defense the week before.

Gary Barden was out for his first game on the Raider blue line and looked very good. The Raiders have also signed Bob Elinesky and had Colin Marple at precise Monday night.

However, Ron Fogal has yet to make an appearance on the blue line this year leaving the team short in that department.

Elinesky will not be in uniform when the team travels up to Collingwood tonight, which means only Brian McBratney, Barden and possible Fogal will be patrolling on defense. Unless the Raiders sign Marple.

Tonelli has been taking a regular turn on defense as well as playing on Kudrasovs' line. The former pro has been a stalwart performer as he has been logging approximately 45 minutes of legitimate game. Tonelli will certainly be taking double shifts up in Collingwood tonight.

Also not dressed for the Raiders against the Sailors were forwards John Lunn and Pat Maloney. Maloney is still playing football and Lunn has a nagging injury and also has no transportation down from Alliston.

The absence of the signed players had not meant too much to the team so far as they have played a couple of the weaker clubs. However, against Collingwood tonight and Thornhill Friday night the Raiders may need all their horses.
