Kai-Shin Karate Club starts their new season

The Kai-Shin Karate Club started the new season a couple of weeks back and the enrolment of the recreation department program is now 18.

The club's instructor is Kent Robinson, who has a brown belt, and classes are run three times a week at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

Robinson is implementing some new ideas this time around as he will have judo and karate people instruct at the classes.

"We're bringing in Bill Zilio to teach boxing," Robinson said. "Also Terry Campbell, who has a brown belt in judo, will teach at a couple of classes."

The course began in January of this year when the recreation department's Karen King approached Robinson about teaching a course.

Robinson had his first tournament winners a couple of weeks ago when Lynn and Jane Cartwright both came away with trophies from a tournament in Richmond Hill. Lynn, a green belt, was second in sparring and Jane, an orange belt, was third in kata.

Jane also competed in the sparring section and tied three times with males before being eliminated.

Robinson said he hopes to be taking his students to more tournaments this year. "We went to a few last year, but basically just as spectators," he said.

Jane and Lynn are both members of the Kai-shin fighting team. They will definitely be going to more tournaments. There are five Kai-shin clubs. Of Robinson's 18 students, 14 are from Georgetown. Two are from Acton and the other two are from Milton. The great

majority of the students began their karate training with Robinson.

Because he is not a black belt Robinson can not grade his students up. He brings in instructors from Toronto to grade and to also act as guest instructors.

When the program began 10 months ago Robinson had 25 students. "The number has gone down because people came and realize that karate is very hard work and that they can't do it," Robinson said.

Robinson, a former Georgetown Raider, started taking karate lessons four years ago. He had a club on Armstrong Avenue before beginning this one.

Anyone interested in joining the course, which costs \$45 for 10 weeks, can contact Robinson at the arena on Tuesdays, Thursdays or Sundays, the days classes are held.

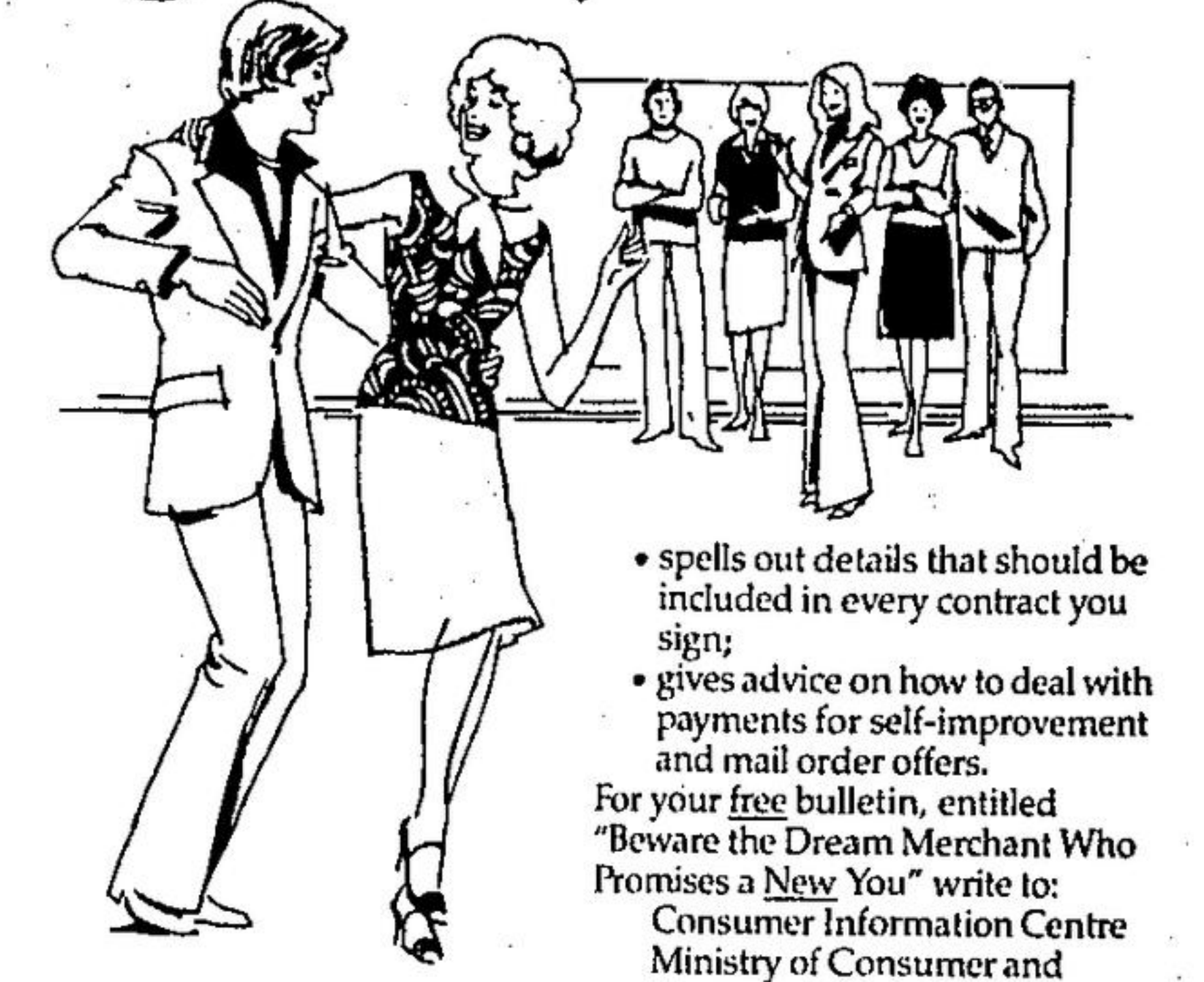
