Town will be in a better position to consider specific problems relating to parks and recreational facilities.

POMEROY — (No response).

HILL — What is your opinion of regional government in Halton?

HILL — I have elaborated my position on this question, elsewhere in this newspaper.

POMEROY — My opinion of Regional government is secondary to the fact that it is with us and we must make it work. I think it is important that we have strong Regional Councillors who can make our views known at Regional Council and who can keep us well informed of what is taking place there.

HILL — When the interests of their area municipality conflict with those of the Region, do you think regional councillors should vote to help their areas or to help the region as a whole? (The same question could apply to conflicts between the interests of individual wards and the municipality as a whole).

HILL — I represent the Town of Halton Hills on the Regional Council and my foremost concern on that Council always has been and will continue to be the interest of Halton Hills.

On the local level, it is the duty of area Councillors to represent their particular constituencies and the Mayor is very rarely called upon to cast a deciding vote in a dispute among councillors. I believe it is improper for the Mayor to favour any particular area of the town.

POMEROY — The duty of any Councillor is to represent the people who have elected him or her. This is no different at Regional Council. Therefore if such conflicts arise, the Councillor must vote in favour of the area he represents.

LANDFILL SITE

HILL — Do you support regional council's efforts to establish a major landfill site in rural Milton? If not, what alternatives would you favor or like to see investigated?

HILL — After considerable expense of time and money Regional Council has decided upon the location of a major landfilling site in rural Milton and I fully support that decision.

POMEROY — Extensive studies have indicated that Site F is the best location for the Regional Landfill site, however, I think we should be keeping abreast of new technology in the waste disposal area in the hope that the Site F will only be a temporary requirement.

HILL — Do you think Halton region is doing all it can to attract industry and jobs to the region by employing a business development officer?

HILL — The business development officer has done an excellent job, and the creation

of his position clearly indicates the priority the Region places upon the attraction of new industry to the Region.

POMEROY — No municipality can ever do enough to attract new industry. Although our business development officer, Bill Marshall, is working hard to bring new industry to Halton, I think that we must also have a well planned local promotional programme to see that this industry locates in Halton Hills.

BUDGETTING

HILL — Do you feel Halton Hills operates efficiently in terms of budgeting and economics?

HILL — The Town of Halton Hills presently has, in my estimation, one of the best qualified men as Treasurer of any comparably-sized municipality.

POMEROY — I can see many areas where there could be cost savings such as better utilization of our recreational facilities and better ordina-

tion of the programmes of our various departments. I would like to see a Council dedicated to holding the line on spending, creating better efficiency with the money that we now have to spend.

HILL — Do you feel council should continue to support, or even increase its support of citizens' efforts to restore the old Acton town hall?

HILL — Halton Hills Council has given the 'Save the Acton Town Hall Committee' until December 31, 1978, to provide
