The game started very slowly as each team managed only one basket in the first quarter. Acton jumped out to a 10-4 lead by halftime.

In the third quarter Acton began to pull away and led 24-14 when it was over.

The Rebels put on a late spurt and at one point had the score tied at 25.

Rebel coach Betty Tamas said she was not pleased with her team's performance in the game.

On the other side Lyn McLaren had to be very pleased with his club's showing. It was Acton's third win of the year and it came over the first place club.

Barb Wilson chipped in with three points for Acton and Nancy Wong and Kathy Kirsch had two apiece.

Hermanna Vieira led the Rebel scorers with seven points. Jenny Smith had six and Virginia Walker scored five.

Galbraith was again very strong in this game as she led all scorers with 26 points. Nancy Phillips had seven in a losing cause.

## Midgets tie 4-4 and then lose 7-1

The Georgetown Sunny Acre Farms Major Midgets earned one point in two outings last week. They tied Chingouacousy 4-4 and lost to Streetsville 7-1.

Chingouacousy scored very late in the game to earn the tie.

Scott Osborne, Rick Knight, Bill Wheeler and Phil Milne had scored for Georgetown. Tom Simpson assisted on two of the goals.

Against the much bigger and rougher Streetsville team Osborne was the only Georgetown scorer with Steve Robbins and Wheeler assisting.

The midgets now have only one win and two ties to show for seven outings. However, manager Tom Marshall said the team is showing steady improvement.

The GDHS senior football Rebels season came to an unsuccessful end with a 23-17 loss to Blakelock Tabbies at Oakville's Bronte Park Thursday. The Halton semi-final game was played in a fog which was so heavy it was difficult to see from sideline to sideline.

The score was not indicative of the closeness of the game as the Rebels led 14-7 at the half and it was not until the final quarter that the Tabbies pulled away.

Two busloads of fans and many more in their own vehicles made the trip to Oakville to cheer the Rebels on. Before the half was over many of them were doing more screaming at the officials than cheering for the Rebels.

Coach Mike McMahon said his team received their worst officiating of the season in Oakville.

"They just were not communicating with us," McMahon said. "They were not giving us the numbers of players who committed penalties, which is something they had been doing all year."

McMahon also said that because of the fog he could not see the yard markers on the other sideline and the referees were not telling the Rebel coaches what down it was.

"We could not help Gord (Miller, the Rebel quarterback) with plays from the bench because we could not see what we needed," the coach said. "Usually we call a number of plays for Gord."

The call which infuriated McMahon and the fans most occurred near the end of the first half with Georgetown leading 14-7.

The Tabbies were driving when it was snuffed out by a Jim Rountree interception at the goal line. The play was called back because of a penalty to Rebel lineman Jim Taggart.

However, it was not just a penalty. Taggart was thrown out of the game. The referee said he threw the lineman out for intentionally trying to injure an opponent.

"I didn't try to injure him," Taggart said. "After I saw that he released the ball I let up and just tapped him with my arm."

McMahon saw the ejection of Taggart as the main turning point in the game.

"We lost a quality two-way man," McMahon said. "And you just do not replace those type of players."

The ejection of Taggart also cost the Rebels a key offensive play. Taggart plays light end on offense and it appeared Miller could hit him with a pass anytime he wanted to.

The game began successfully enough for the Raiders with a big defensive play by Rountree on the Tabbies first possession.

The Tabbie quarterback tried to hit his receiver with a down and out on second down. Cornerback Rountree read the play perfectly, stepped in from the receiver, intercepted the ball and took it all the way. The convert was missed and the Rebels led 6-0.

On the ensuing kickoff disaster struck. The Tabbies successfully used a reverse and it worked as the returner took it all the way for a Tabbie touchdown. Their convert was good and they led 7-6.

Miller, who was booming punts all evening, then kicked a single to tie the score.

The Rebels went ahead in the second quarter with a little trickery of their own. On fourth down Al Bower was sent into and kick a field from in close.

Holder Miller pulled the ball back, rolled out and hit Rountree with pass in the end zone. This time the Bower convert was good and the Rebels led again 14-7.

The Rebels were not the same team in the second half. A long run early tied the score and after that it was all Tabbies.

"We were really up for the game," McMahon said. "We could easily have won it."

The coach is still very satisfied with the season his team had. They were very competitive in all but one game and two of their three losses in the regular season came in overtime.

McMahon has approximately 15 to 20 of his ball players returning next year. He will be losing quality players such as Miller, Mitch Leblanc, Rob McKeelvey, Bower, Barry Hardmann and John Green, but he figures he should still field a very good team.

Rountree, if he is still at the school, should undoubtedly be the team leader. Although he still junior age he has had an excellent season at receiver and cornerback.

As for the officiating in the semi-final McMahon says it will be brought up when the league executive meets.
