

Our writer revisits "the big, bad city"

In my late 20's I decided that the hustle and bustle of the big city just wasn't for me. I was born and raised in Toronto and since I opted for quiet country living I have rarely entered the downlown core of the city.

The last few weekends have found me back in T.O. and I'm nothing short of amazed at the changes that have sprung up everywhere in the past fifteen years. After nearly two years I finally decided to meet the new Eaton Centre face to face. The only word I can use that adequately fits is "big" - very, very big.

As a young girl a trip "downtown" meant going to Eatons and Simpsons. In the basement Annex there was a walkway between the two stores and ft was never passed without buying a hot ice cream waffle. The aroma from that stand spread up and down the walkway tantalizing the tastebuds until you were forced to indulge. THINGS CHANGED

With the new Centre things have changed. The Annex is now on the 7th floor of Eatons and I considered it a definite experience just in getting there. Yonge Street has a pulse and a heartbeat of its own Stand for 20 minutes on any downtown corner of Yonge and every segment of society will pass you by.

Hawkers and beggars are everywhere · with a wino or two thrown here and there just for atmosphere.

People walk five and six abreast and it reminds me of the midway at the Exhibition, When we hear rumblings of world over population it registers but never with the impact that a few hours on Yonge Street does. You wonder where all the people come from and, stepping along so lively, where they are all headed.

I couldn't believe the variety of people that passed by, some so strange that along with the dozens of languages being spoken I had the feeling that I was almost in a foreign land. For the most part I was,

In terms of fashion it was like entering a time machine you could gaze at the 20's, 30's, 40's, 50's, etc. · you name it they wore it. Racoon coats and tatty furs really big with the younger set high padded shoulders on velvet jackets a tam on the head and the highest heels that could be walked upon. Whatever the "look" it was to be seen on Yonge

Song and dance men abounded. One guy had a harmonica and a guitar and sang and tapped dance all at the same time, a regular one man band.

Young kids 12 and under hustled flowers. A kid-with a dummy did a fair ventriloquist act, a crippled accordian player, all claiming a certain "sidewalk spot" and there they sat at least the three weekends in a row I passed.

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
