Ward I regional Coun. Pat McKenzie announced Monday night that he will not be requesting a recount of votes east in last week's municipal election in which he was defeated by a seven-vote margin.

Coun. McKenze declined to seek re-election to regional council, but was one of four candidates for two Ward 1 seats on area council. Incumbent Coun. Les Duby polled the most votes in that race, but newcomer Ross Knechtel ended up with a seven-vote lead on Coun: McKenzie when all the ballots were counted.

"Tonight concludes 12 years of involvement in municipal politics for me," Coun. Me-Kenzle announced to his colleagues on council at their final meeting Monday, "Winning is not the only thing. It is

not my plan to have a recount at this time. There are just too many major issues facing council in the coming term".

positions in the recent election. It is expected that council will elect its chairman once again by secret ballot, contrary to terms of the Ontario Municipal Act, which requires open voting. Concerned that an open ballot could invite political maneuvering, the 1976 council members took advantage of a loophole in the provincial legislation by which their individual choice for a new chairman was kept secret.

UNOFFICIAL FORUM To do so, council convened into its "unofficial" forum - the committee of the whole - and held a secret ballot to elect the new chairman. The vote was then ratified officially in council, with members voting unanimously to endorse the can .didate who received the most votes in committee of the

If there are more than two

minimees for the post and none receives the necessary 13-vote acclaimed to their respective majority, council will utilize an elimination process by which the number of votes on each successive ballot will be gradually reduced.

If the candidates are narrowed down to two and the vote is tied, the regional clerk will draw lots to determine the winner. As in the case of Mr. Morrow's victory two years ago, if the elected chairman is already a council member, his home municipality has the option of appointing someone elo fill the vacancy of calling a

by election. With Mr. Morrow's ascendance to the chairmanship in 1976, Ward 4 area Coun. Mike Armstrong, who received the most votes in that election, stepped in to join regional council. Runner-up in the 1976 election for Ward 4, Marilyn Serjeantson, found herself filling Coun. Armstrong's area council post as a result.

Town council is taking steps to ensure that a River Road homeowner is not indirectly victimized by the bankruptcy of the River Run townhouse subdivision adjacent to his properly.

River Run

At the request of Coun. Roy Booth, town staff will investigate the availability of developer's funds to cover the cost of repairs to the homeowner's water supply lines, which were severed when sanitary sewer pipes were being extended into the presently-dormant construction project.

Coun, Booth told council Monday night that the devetoper, whose efforts to build the subdivision came to an abrupt halt last month because of financial problems, replaced a watermain to the homeowner's property with a plastic hose pipe when it was damaged during sewer installation.
