#### Boyce injures leg


You'd have to go a long way before you would find a more dedicated hockey player than the Georgetown Raiders' John Boyce.

Junior Tibbits, who coached the team for two and half years before Gerry Inglis took over this year, said that Boyce was without a doubt the inspirational leader of the

Boyce has been one of the only defensemen who coach Inglis could count on game in and game out this year. Come hell or high water Boyce would be at the game. The only other defenseman who can make that claim is Ron Twiss, who joined the team late.

In last Friday's 8-3 Raider win in Dundas Boyce suffered bruised ligaments in his knee and had to leave the game.

"I had gone into the game with a badly sprained ankle that I suffered in the game in Port Colborne," Boyce said, "If we had had more defensemen I would not have dressed for the Dundas game." The Raiders went into the Dundas game with only Twiss and Gary Barden.



"I tried it for a couple of shifts after that, but then I realized it would not hold up," the defensemen said. Boyce is seeing a chiropractor and he said Tuesday that the leg felt 100 per cent better than it did on the weekend.

Boyce is hoping that he will be in the lineup this Friday when the Fort Eric Mavericks come to town. "I'm hoping that I can play against the Mavericks, but I don't know," the veteran said. "I will definitely be

back in action for the game the next week." Boyce is the second Raider veteran that has gone down in the past couple of weeks. Forward Steve Blundy

suffered a ruptured spleen in a game in Thorold. Boyce may be the last of a dying breed amongst the Raiders. Most of the players on the present roster were well-scouted by the Raider executive before being signed. Boyce, 3t, joined the team several years back when

he walked into the arena and just asked for a tryout. He has been a mainstay with the club ever since. Last year he was the team's captain.

Soon after Boyce went out in Dundas there was talk that he would not be back in the lineup for quite awhile. John Boyce is not an easy man to keep down. He'll try it Friday against the Mavericks, and you can bet his leg will have to be in pretty bad shape if he's not dressed when the game begins,

Georgetown's Ian Clark is the best junior cross-country runner in all of Canada.

Clark, a grade 12 student at Georgelown district high schoo, won the Canadian crosscountry championships held at Vancouver's Stanley Park on Saturday.

Ray Paulins, who two weeks ago won the senior OFSAA championship at Scarborough College, finished second some five seconds behind Clark. It was run over a 8,000-metre

Clark said his strategy for the race was to hang on

Paulins' shoulder for the first part of the race.

"I knew Paulius would take off fast," said Clark, "I hung on his shoulder for the first half of the race and then at about the halfway point I took the lead." The Georgetown
