Sailors no match for Raiders, MacDonald back between pipes

The Georgetown Raiders snapped a six-game losing streak in convincing fashion last Tuesday thumping the Sailors 7-2 in Port Colborne.

Mario MacDonald was in the net for the first time this season, but the long layoff did not affect his sharpness as he was at his best.

The game's scoresheet indicated that MacDonald faced 37 shots while Sailor goalkeepers Ron Skibin and Rob Stewart had 23 and 18 respectively.

Over the weekend, the official shot keeper must have forgotten his glasses at home, because the majority of play was at the Sailors' end of the rink and the visitors certainly had more shots at the net.

MacDonald was forced to

make some very tough saves, especially in the third period when the Raiders had built up a big lead and therefore let up a little.

The Raider defense has been a cause for concern for Raider coach Gerry Inglis all year, but they came up with a good effort in Port Colborne.

On the other hand, the Sailor blue liners were porous as they allowed the Raider forwards plenty of skating room and several of the visitor's goals came on two-on-one breaks.

"When you win 7-2 every body has had to have played a pretty good game," Inglis said after the game. "That team is not very good at all however."

It was the second time this season the Raiders trounced

the Sailors. In the second game of the season they beat them 6-1 at Alcott Arena.

The first Raider goal came on a two-on-one just over three minutes into the first period. Chris Milne, who played a solid game, broke in with Tom Daley. At the last second Milne slid the puck over to his linemate who shot it into the vacated net. Skibin had gone out to meet Milne. Ron Swiss also earned an assist.

After the goal the Raiders continued to press but could not put the finishing touches on the play.

Another two-on-one break resulted in the Raider's second goal of the night. This time Novis went in with Pat Maloney. Again Novis waited until

Skibin moved out before passing it over to Maloney who put it away. MacDonald, who started the play, also earned an assist.

The third goal was scored by Juri Kudrasovs, who tipped in John Boyce's hard blast from the point. Ray Tonelli also earned an assist.

With 1:59 left in the period the Raiders went up by four goals. Tonelli was set in alone on Skibin and the big winger had no problems, taking the puck on his backhand and easily beating the goalie. Colin Gordon and Ray Evans had the assists.

With only 51 seconds gone in the second period the home-side got on the scoreboard when Rob Head rapped home a rebound.

Four minutes later the Raiders scored on the power play. Kudrasovs, who was playing the point on the power play, moved in and Evans hit him with a pass from the corner. All Kudrasovs had to do was put it into the open net.

At the 8:15 mark Daley scored his second of the night on another power play. He moved in from behind the net and slid it past Rob Stewart, who had taken over in the Sailor net. Tonelli and Evans had the assists.

Another two-on-one break late in the period resulted in the seventh Raider goal. This time Kudrasovs broke in with Gordon. Again Kudrasovs held the puck until the goaltender moved out and then slid it to Gordon who put it away. Tonelli also had an assist.

In the third period the Raiders lost their edge and did not add to their tally.

Early in the frame Mike Soucie scored the second Sailor goal from a scramble in front of the net.

The win was a very important one for the Raiders. Although it came against what is probably the league's weakest club, the Raiders showed signs of getting their game together.

They broke out of their own zone better than they have in any other game this season and the defensemen hung tough in front of MacDonald.

Raiders trounce Dundas 8-3 to claim big road victory

The Georgetown Raiders claimed an important victory Friday night when they trounced the Merchants 8-3 right in Dundas.

The Raider victory avenged a 5-4 loss they suffered at the hands of the Merchants the previous Friday at Alcott Arena. It also extended the Raiders' modest win streak to two games. Previous to the two victories the Raiders had suffered six straight losses.

The victory did not come without a price. John Boyce, the former captain, and one of the team's remaining defense-

men suffered a leg injury and will probably miss some action. Young Steve Novis will sit out two games as a result of a major misconduct he received during a third period altercation with Dave Brazel.

Pete McDuffe had his best game of the season thus far in the Raider net. Although he only made a modest 27 saves, many of them came off Merchant shots from in close.

The Raiders went most of the way with only two defensemen as a result of Boyce's injury. The two were Ron Swiss and Gary Barden. Bob

Ellinsky was under suspension from an altercation in Port Colborne and Neil Cotton has yet to return to the lineup after having a falling out with coach Gerry Inglis.

Ray Tonelli was again on hand to save the day. The big forward played both forward and defense and was on the ice for most of the game's sixty minutes.

The game also featured another line, aside from the Juri Kudrasovs trio, handling the bulk of the Raider scoring.

The Terry Porter-Novis-Pat Maloney line scored four of the Raider goals.

Maloney, nicknamed "Hat Trick" in his previous stint as a Raider, showed that name is very appropriate as he pocketed three goals in the third period.

His linemates also had three points each. Novis had a goal and two assists, before leaving

and Porter had three assists.

The Raiders, as in the game in Port Colborne, did not take long to get on the scoresheet. With only 1:07 gone Colin Gordon put the puck behind Sam Restivo, who started in the Merchant net. Barden earned the assist on the play.

The Merchants drew even for the only time in the game, other than the beginning, when Joe McKenna tallied at the 8:41 mark of the period.

Tom Daley put the Raiders up again slightly over two minutes later with assists going to his linemates Chris Milne and Ray Evans.

Before the period was out the Raiders had built their lead to 4-1. Novis scored from Barden at the 14:53 mark. Ray Tonelli then scored the fourth goal with Daley and Barden getting the assists.

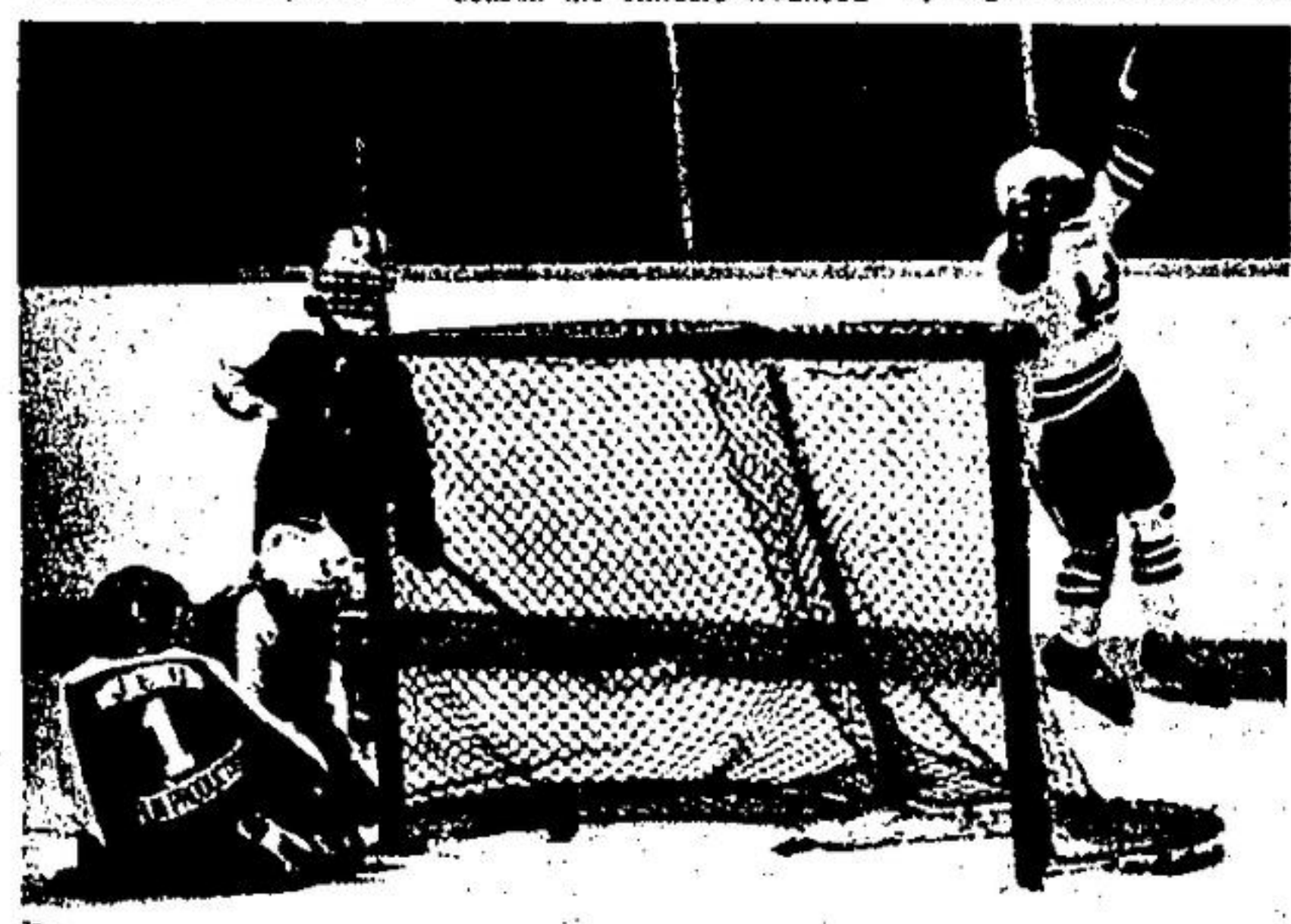
Collingwood, the team Raider coach Gerry Inglis says is the toughest he's seen this year, is still going strong with two one-sided victories last week.
