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Pemberton collection in Royal extravaganza

TORONTO—An Acton man's hobby has provided a touch of nostalgia for thousands of people every day at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto.

J.D. Pemberton, president of the Royal, brought some of his unique collection of antique horse drawn vehicles from Acton for "The Royal Looks Back" a parade in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the agricultural extravaganza.

The carriages have all been restored to original condition some even retaining the original paint.

Mr. Pemberton's carriages included Hansom cab, the

original taxi, with handles operated by the driver to open the doors and to lift a glass screen for the comfort of the passengers. It boasts a speaking hole in the roof to allow the driver to speak to the customers inside.

He also brought a Democrat the original pickup truck-with removable seats so it could be used to carry a load without the seats, or it could be used for a family Sunday drive.

There was a traditional survey with a fringe, a Bronson carriage and a very elite stagecoach, plush with velvet seats and brass lanterns.

MILK WAGON
The parade included four

vehicles not owned by Mr. Pemberton; a Silverwood's milk wagon, complete with antique milk bottles; a butcher wagon, an Eaton's delivery wagon and an Imperial Oil wagon.

But the star of the show was Mr. Pemberton's fire engine. Drawn by a team of black percherons owned and driven by Lloyd McEnery of Limehouse, the wagon demonstrated the firefighting techniques of a day long past.

The pumper has a firebox that was originally kept stoked in the fire hall at all times. When the engine went out the firemen built up the fire to provide steam to run the pump.

Built in 1880 in Ontario, the fire engine is in original condition.

Mr. McEnery explained the heavy team of draught horses is needed because the vehicle weighs four tons - a heavy load for the strongest horses. He said it was originally pulled by a team of three horses, but for the show the two horse team was sufficient.

Some of Mr. Pemberton's private collection can be seen at Guelph area parades, pulled by his team of Dutch Gelderlands, a strong dark brown breed rarely seen in Canada.

contradicts himself while giving evidence, Mr. Benner said, let it stand when you cross-examine him. If any points are to be clarified in such circumstances, let the judge do it.

Once the plaintiff, then the defendant, have presented their evidence and cross-examined witnesses in the same order, Mr. Benner explained, each is called upon to summarize his case. The judge will then either announce judgement or else reserve judgement to some future date, possibly several weeks or months in the future.

Having won the decision, though, does not always mean the battle is over for the

successful party. Mr. Benner cautioned. If the party against whom the court has ruled still refuses to pay the claim, the plaintiff should obtain a judgement summons from the court clerk, which necessitates another hearing at which the judge will attempt to arrange payment of the claim.

UNDER OATH
At such hearings, the debtor must testify under oath and in the creditor's presence why he has not paid the claim and whether or not he will ever be able to do so. Often, an installment payment plan is arranged.

If the debtor fails to keep up payments for a period of more

than 14 days, the creditor can then bring him back into court with a "show cause" summons. There is no imprisonment for debt in Ontario, Mr. Benner stressed.

Arrangements must then be made for the creditor to garnish, through the clerk, up to 30 per cent of the debtor's wages by approaching his employer or bank where he may have an account. The garnishment of employment wages is handled on a weekly basis and requires a new set of documents to be prepared and signed for each instance.

"A lot of the time you find out your fellow simply has no money and never will have any," Mr. Benner warned. "In that case, it's best to just go away and forget all about it."

The seizure of a debtor's personal belongings is "not very practical," he added, as a result of many exemptions allowed by the courts and the financial limitations on the amount the debtor can keep.

SELL PROPERTY
Judgements can be obtained that will prevent the debtor

from selling his property for a period of up to six years, and are renewable after that.

Serious problems greet the creditor if the debtors moves away from Ontario, Mr. Benner said. The best alternative is for the creditor to have the court clerk forward copies of the judgement to the small claims court in the area where the debtor now resides.

If the dispute initially stemmed from a traffic mishap, there is provision to have the debtor's driver's licence suspended until payments are made, Mr. Benner explained.

A more detailed examination of the requirements and operation of small claims courts in Ontario can be found in two publications available from the Halton Hills Legal Aid Clinic or the provincial ministry of the attorney general.

The Legal Clinic's third and final seminar will look into family law tonight (Wednesday) at Knox Presbyterian church in Georgetown. The seminar begins at 8 p.m.

Nine thefts this week in Halton Hills homes

Break and enters and thefts continue to present major problems to Halton Regional Police, with six break and enters and nine thefts occurring in Halton Hills in the past week.

An Acton man saw two men on his property but they fled in a blue Pontiac or Buick on his arrival. He later found a window had been smashed and they had gained entry to his home. Nothing appears to be missing. One of the suspects was described as being a man aged approximately 35 to 40, 5'9" in height, and weighing 150 pounds. He was wearing dark blue pants and a blue and white sweater.

A rural resident in Halton Hills reported an attempted break-in at his home late Wednesday afternoon. Someone tried unsuccessfully to pry open a rear window at the premises.

A Georgetown resident reported the theft of a 42-channel Citizens' Band radio from his vehicle, which was parked at Georgetown District High School at the time of the theft.

A woman living on Hillcrest Street in Acton has had a window in her residence smashed, probably by youths throwing a stone, she believes.

A Halton Hills man is receiving bills from a gas company for items which were purchased with his credit card, which he had previously reported to police as having been stolen. Police are investigating.

An unknown vehicle ran into a cement pillar at the end of the laneway of a residence on RR3, Georgetown.

Munro ruled part of force

The Ontario Police Commission has ruled that Halton Regional Police administrator Ray Munro is a member of the police force.

At a hearing held at the OPC office on October 13, it was ruled that Mr. Munro is a member of the force. The hearing was held as a result of a request by the Halton police commission and the Halton Regional Police Association.

As a result of the OPC decision, which was received at the police commission meeting Thursday, it was decided that Mr. Munro's function as secretary to the board would be curtailed, since the commission considered it "unseemly" to have a member of the force acting as a secretary to the commission.
