**Unidentified body still baffles police**

Halt Regional Police are still unable to identify the body of a woman found on the Chudleigh Farm property on Highway 25, north of Highway 401. Police have asked members

of the public, who may know something about the lady to contact them. Detective Ron Welsh said several calls were received shortly after the body was discovered October 29, but no calls have been received recently.

**Building permits**

Building permits issued in Halton Hills during October totalled \$787,850 in value and brought in \$2,436.10 in issuance fees.

The vast bulk of the permits - \$331,000 worth - stemmed from the construction of single family dwellings outside of registered plans of subdivision. Home alterations, swimming pool installations and garage construction commanded another \$97,000, while new commercial buildings warranted \$188,000 worth of permits.

The town's engineering department and building inspector have issued \$10,212,326 worth of permits thus far this year.

Police are hoping anyone who may have crossed paths with the lady in the area some time before her death will come forward. This kind of information would allow them to trace the lady's movements and possibly establish her identity.

Identification of the woman, who died some time in 1977, has been hampered by the fact that she had no teeth. Teeth are often the only way by which people can be identified, particularly if the body is disfigured.

The woman was a Caucasian about 5'3" to 5'4" in height, with a slim build, and narrow hips. Police estimate her age to have been from 55 to 65. She had blonde-grey hair, and was

Examination of the woman's bones by forensic scientists have indicated the woman suffered severe osteoarthritis, and may have had difficulty getting around.

Police found a pair of men's brown-rimmed glasses near the body, and also a pair of black ladies' shoes, a pair of low brown hiking boots, a blue nylon jacket, and a blue wool sweater.

Police also found a white plastic bag containing two Bibles. Pieces of burnt wood were found near the body, and police think the woman may have stayed in the area for several days, but they have not found any cooking utensils or empty food packages to back up that theory.

**NEW CROWN ATTORNEY'S CAR TOWED BY POLICE**

Halt Regional Police commission turned down a request by one of Halton's assistant crown attorneys that they refund the amount due on a towing charge after his car was towed away on his first day in Oakville court recently.

It cost Tony Vale \$21 in towing charges when his car was towed away because it was parked in the wrong spot. There are spots outside the Oakville court office reserved

for police parking, some for court employee parking and some for municipal parking. Police administrator Ray Munro said it is an ongoing problem making sure there are adequate parking spaces for all.

Commission members condemned the towing away of cars without giving at least one prior warning in the form of a warning sticker on the winds-

shield. Mr. Munro said there is a manpower problem involved in keeping track of parking and who is where. Court employees often park in spots clearly marked as police parking, he said, and others are guilty of parking in clearly marked spots.

Mr. Vale has said that the spaces allotted for court personnel were all occupied, so he parked elsewhere.

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
