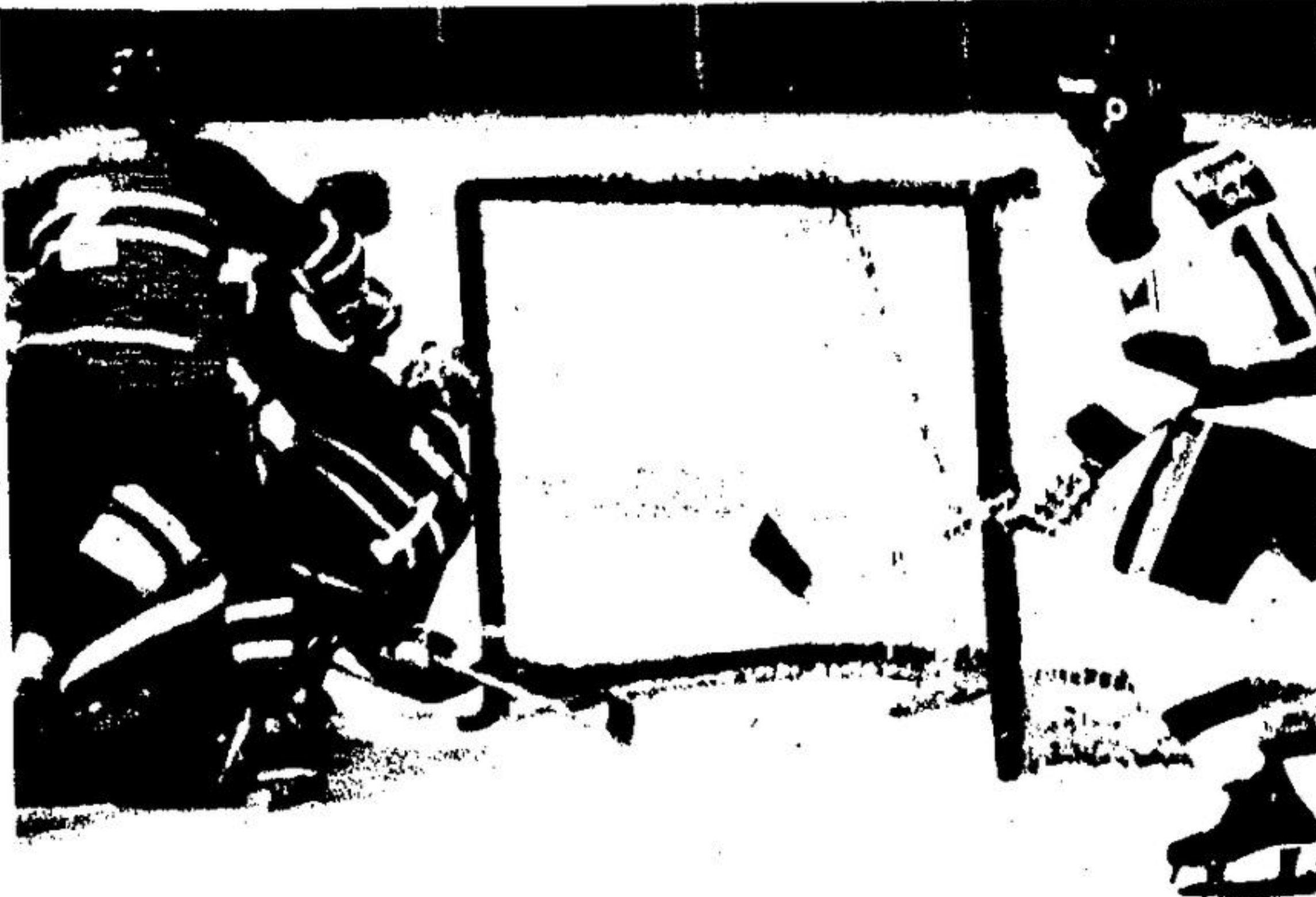

After the Turner goal the game turned into a defensive struggle.

Brampton seemed content to bottle the Gems up and try to hold onto the two-goal lead.

The first period was very cleanly played as referee Wendell Brown did not call any penalties.

The visitors' defensive approach worked in the second period as they allowed the Gems only five shots on net and at times slowed the game down to a walk.

### MILLER SHARP

Brad Miller was sharp in the second period and not one of the 11 Brampton shots beat him.

In the third period the Gems came very close to scoring in the early going. They got the puck behind goaltender Scott Mill, but it rested on the goal line until the netminder saw it and fell on it.

As it turned out that would have been a very important marker as the Gems put on a determined drive to earn a point.

Georgetown's hard work, paid off with 3:58 left to play as Paul Martin beat Mills on the power play. Crossman and Turner earned the assists on the goal.

Talking about CHRISTMAS, I am running a series on "what to buy" on my T.V. SHOW on Halton Cable. In conjunction with this, why not try something different? Let the family do the cooking this year. I always try to get my nose in the kitchen but I cannot beat my wife's tremendous culinary craft. That is where the sour dough comes in. This is my domain and I take the task to heart.

Don't tell anyone but it is easy to get started, simply dissolve 1 tablespoon dry yeast in 2 cups water and add enough flour to make a creamy batter.

I use a more complicated process, but this will do for a start. Store in a fruit preserving jar without the rubber seal. The day before using add 1 cup flour and enough water to make it creamy again.

Next week, I repeat to use it. Suffice it to say that you should get it started now, as it does improve with use and age.

It becomes obvious to me that there are a lot of hunters that do not know how or where to hunt for grouse. Not only that, but they insist on calling them partridge.

The GRAY or HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE is a diverse species, belonging to the family PHASIANIDAE.

The GROUSE, either ruffed or spruce along with Partridge belong to the family Tetraonidae. I know it is technical, but a knowledge of the species you hunt will help you in understanding our game laws.

Grouse tends to inhabit "pockets" or areas that are best suited to their diet and protective requirements. Where you hunted them last year may not be as good as it was, but a little investigation may show that they moved over to the next bush lot.

Contrary to popular belief, you cannot "hunt out" an area. Last Saturday, a Toronto daily newspaper had a full page piece on the new Gun Control Law. There will be long and strong repercussions to this biased article.

Use of terms such as "a gun toting society" left the reader with thoughts of the "wild west" where everyone "toted" a gun and used it at the drop of a hat. Coroner Dr. Margaret Milton wants stiffer gun laws so "Canadian cities won't be turned into armed camps." That is one of the dumbest statements that the anti-gun DODO's are spouting. Can you imagine a city the size of Toronto being an "armed camp"?

It takes all kinds to make a world, but I wish they would stay out of my world.
