Alternate Cantrakon site sought

Special to The Herald Officials of Cantrakon Ltd. are in the process of narrowing down a list of over 30 alternate sites that have been submitted since the company announced last month that another location for the controversial convention centre would be considered.

Among the alternate sites under consideration are six suggested by the Caledon Ratepayers Association.

Six sites were submitted by letter to Housing Minister Claude Bennett who agreed in November that he would arrange a meeting between Cantrakon officials and the ratepayers who oppose the cen-

tre on its present location. In the letter to Mr. Bennett CRA President John Alexander described the six alternate sites, all within Town of Caledon boundaries, and sald that he did not wish to meet with Cantrakon until all the sites have been investigated.

The ratepayers have taken the stand that they are in favor of having the convention centre in the town, but on a less environmentally sensitive site, where fewer people would be affected.

Cantrakon officials have not yet made any site visits but are trying to narrow down the selection according to the descriptions of land that have been submitted.

Susan Zwickel, assistant to Cantrakon, lawyer Robert Jarvis, told the Times that about two-thirds of the suggested alternate sites are in the Cale-OUTSIDE CALEDON

Although sites outside Caledon have also been suggested, she said Caledon is still the prime area of consideration because of its proximity to Toronto International Airport. A major portion of the convention centre's visitors are expected to come from cities

other than Toronto. Ms. Zwickel said that the company hopes to have the list reduced to a few of the most viable sounding sites within a week, and that the CRA will be

contacted at that time, She said that the Cantrakon company has had discussions with the ratepayers to keep them informed of company procedures.

Ms. Zwickel had previously described reports that the company would consider an alternate site as "exaggerated." She had said that because of the time and money already invested in the current site at five sideroad and the second line west that it was unlikely that the company would ser-

iously consider an alternative. Asked if she had changed her opinion Ms. Zwickel said that she would make no comment on the matter.

New pollution deadline


OTTAWA -- The federal government expects new deadlines on pollution control prog-rams should result in a marked improvement in Great Lakes water quality, MP Frank Philbrook has learned.

Environment Minister Len Marchand told the Halton Liberal MP in the House of Commons that the new agreement with the U.S., concluded during a recent visit by State Secretary Cyrus Vance, provi-des 1982 and 1983 deadlines for industrial and municipal pollution control programs.

"We expect to make great strides in all aspects of pollutfon control in the Greak Lakes under this new agreement," Marchand stated.

Philbrook, prompted by Queen's Park claims that U.S. cities and states have failed to enact adequate legislation to control phosphorous levels, suggested Marchand pressure the Americans to take more effective action.

Marchand acknowledged that 99 per cent of the Canadian side of the Great Lakes is served by adequate sewage treatment facilities while only '65 per cent of the Americans have adequate services. But when the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement was enacted, only five per cent of the Americana had acceptable sewage facilities, he added.
