BOOK REVIEWS

Canadian authors offer variety of Christmas books

By VINCENT EGAN Canadian book publishers, at this time each year, offer their biggest annual array of bigtickel, high-prestige merchandise for the gift-giving season. Here are notes on some of the 1978 offerings:

- Modern Painting In Canada, by Terry Fenton and Karen Wilkin (Hurtig Publishers; \$14.95 to Dec. 31, \$18.95 thereafter). The 53 full-color reproductions of twentiethcentury paintings in this book help to demonstrate the strength and vitality of our often neglected artists. The collection was organized by the Edmonton Art Gallery as part of the cultural program of the Commonwealth Games held in

that city this past summer. - Danby: Images Of Sport. by Ken Danby: text by Hobert de Santana (Macmillan of Canada; \$39.95). Canada's foremost realist painter is represented here by a portfolio of six prints of water colors - 14 by 12 inches - of Olympic competitors tgymnast, high jumper, diver, sprinter, sculler, eyelist), accompanying a book with 50 more Danby paintings, either in full color of half tone. The prints and book are in a boxed presentation

.. - The World Series: A 75th Anniversary, edited by Joseph L. Reichler (General Publishing Co.; 283 pages; \$18.95). Baseball is surely the most intellectually satisfying of team sports and this 75-year round-up of the highlights of the post-season championship contests will help fans to get through that long, dry spell between the ninth inning of the deciding World Series game and the first work-out in spring training. The artwork is outstanding: the commentaries interesting, and the statistical

wrap-up well organized. .- The Royal Winnipeg Ballet: The First Forty Years, by Max Wyman (Doubleday Canada; 268 pages; \$17.95). Founded in 1938, the Winnipeg Ballet was not only the first such company (by 13 years) and the first to represent Canada overseas, but also the first in the Commonwealth to merit the designation of "royal". The history of the company, including its rivalry with the Toronto-based National Ballet, is engagingly recounted, and supplemented by 125 black-and -white photographs of except-

ional interest - The National Ballet of Canada: A Celebration: photographs by Ken Bell; text by Celia Franca (University of Toronto Press; 284 pages; \$24.95). Dancer Cella Franca came from England in 1951 to found the National Ballet Company - and, in 1959, the National Ballet School - on a shoestring. Fortunately, Ken Bell has been on hand ever since to photograph, beautifully, this artistic success story. His photographs, and founder Franca's recollections of the ballet company's incredible progress, make a memorable

- Faces From History: Canadian Profiles And Portraits, he George Woodcock (Hurtig Publishers; 252 pages \$24.95 to Dec. 31, 1978; \$29.95 thereafter). This is a large-format collection of 120 full-page monochrome photographs, each with a biography on the facing page, of Canadians who have made their mark on our hislory - from William Lyon Mackenzie to "Bible Bill" Aberhart - grouped according to the nature of their achieve-

Ontario Northland Railway 1902-1962, by Albert Tucker (Fitzhenry and Whiteside; 210 pages; \$9.95 paperback). After the transcontinental railways linked Canada sea to sea, the discovery of gold and silver in the Porcupine area of Ontario created a need for a railway northward. What is now the Ontario Northland finally reached Moosonee in 1932, giving Ontario a scaport of its own, Prof. Tucker recounts its history with academic

thoroughness. .. - A Picture History of Ontario, by Roger Hall and Gordon Dodds (Hurtig Publishers; 221 pages; \$15.95). Hall, an academic specializing in Ontario history, and Dodds, an archivist with the Public Archives of Canada, have put together a fresh look at the growth of Canada's central province over the past two centuries, with a wealth of unfamiliar photographs and other graphies. The authors have placed a refreshingly unacademic emphasis on every-day people

of Ontario's past. - Yesterday's Toronto, 1870-1910, edited by Linda Shapiro (Coles Publishing Co.; 160 pages; \$8.95) These are the good old days to which Toronto's so-called reform mayor and his political followers would take the city back - no reliable cars, no subways, no suburbs, subsistence wages, rampant street crime. It's fun to wallow in the nostalgia of a century ago with the help of these rare photographs, but they make you grateful for the much maligned progress of recent decades.

- Colombo's Book Of Canuda, edited by John Robert Colombo (Hurtig Publishers; 175 pages; \$12.95 paperback). This is a somewhat eccentric assemblage of writings, statisties, anthems, photographs and the like - described by Its compiler as "a primer of basic Canadian and a reader of unusual Canadian writing." The anthology necessarily refl ects the individual leanings of Columbo; accepted on that basis, it makes an interesting reference work. .- The Mountains Of Canada
