Way-Jay downs Chiefs in Industrial action

Norval nipped DeBoer's Movers 6-5 in Georgetown Industrial Hockey League action Sunday. In other action United Rental shutout Philp Publishing 3-0 and Way Jay were 2-1 winners over Caledon Chiefs.

It was the second time this year DeBoer's has come close to putting a blemish on Norval's perfect record.

Dave Holmes opened the scoring on an unassisted effort early in the game.

Blake Shortill, from Claude David and Bob Inglis, tied it up for DeBoer's.

Brian Beaumont, from Charlie Knoepfli and Ray Inglis, and Doug Anderson, from Blake Inglis and Beaumont, put Norval ahead by two.

With only 15 seconds showing on the clock Doug Barnes tallied from Bob Fotheringham and Shortill and the two teams went into the dressingroom after one period with Norval leading 3-2.

Beaumont converted a Charlie Knoepfli pass at the 7:15 mark of the second period and Norval was two goals ahead again.

Before the period was out DeBoer's Bob Inglis set the stage for a good finish when he scored from David.

It only took Anderson 12 seconds of the third period to put Norval ahead by two goals for the third time. Beaumont and Ray Inglis set up the goals.

Barnes, from Rick Becker and Fotheringham, and Inglis, from David and Steve Hulme, then scored the goals to tie the score for DeBoer's. Inglis goal came with 15:17 still showing on the clock.

With just under five minutes remaining to be played Anderson completed his hat trick and

gave Norval their twelfth win. Beaumont and Tom Fendley set him up.

It was all Crawford Bell in the Philp - Rent-All game. He scored all three of the game's goals.

Chris Broadbent and Scott McClelland had assists on two of the goals and Dave Paterson earned one assist.

Darryl Thompson earned his first shutout of the year in the game.

Way-Jay and Chiefs treated the fans to an excellent game in the day's late contest.

Bob Landry opened the scoring at the 16:41 mark of the first

period to put Way-Jay ahead. Jim Blair and Dwayne Hay set him up. The first period ended 1-0 Way-Jay.

Ted Hurren tallied late in the second period, from Ernie Schaump and Rick Rodgers, to tie the score for the Chiefs.

Blair won the game with a goal at the 13:39 mark of the final period. Hay had the assist.

Philp will try to get back on the winning track and knock Norval down to earth when the two team's faceoff in January 7's late game. Due to the holiday season there will be no games the next two weeks.

The other Rebel to win his division was Kevin Brown at 134 and a half pounds. Smith said Brown had one of his best days even as a Rebel in this tournament.

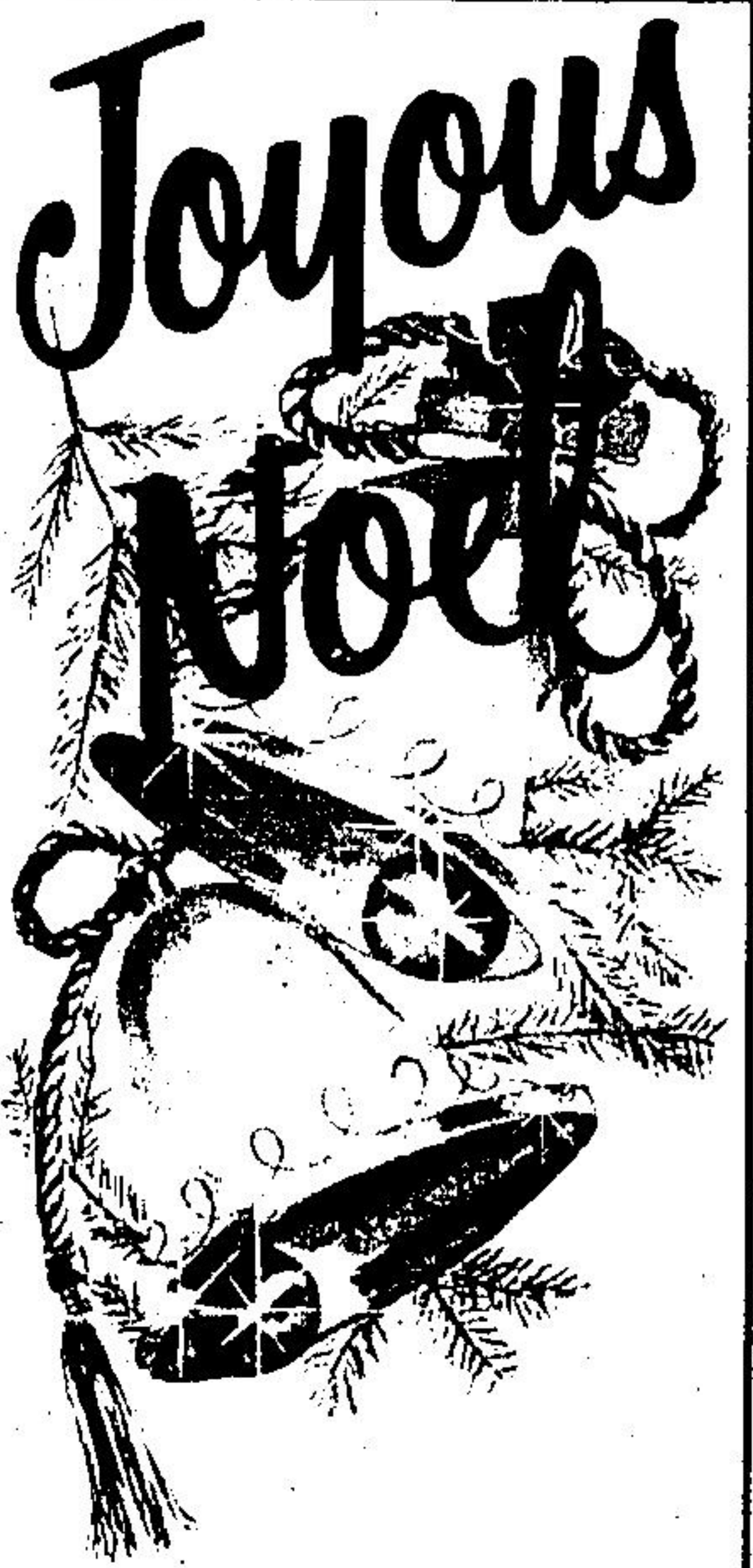
