

in 1979. Under the Credit Valley Conservation Authority's private land referestation program, 85,000 seedling trees will be planted for landowners in the

Approximately 20,000 trees will be planted on Authority lands and 1,000 shrubs and larger trees will provide landscaping in the multiple-use conservation areas.
