

Former Gemini make Queen's

Former Georgetown Gemini Joe South is taking a regular shift on the blueline corps of the Queen's University Golden Gaels hockey team.

South, who last year was named the Most Valuable Defenseman in the Central Junior loop, is the only freshman to have cracked the Queen's roster this year.

Queen's record so far this year is seven wins, six losses and two ties.

South has also had a chance to compete against a couple of other Georgetowners so far in the early season.

Queen's hosted a tournament in the final they went up against St. Lawrence University, where Dean and Dick Popiel are on scholarship.

Dean Popiel gave St. Lawrence the tournament championship when he scored in the second overtime period.

South also travelled down to play Cornell where Queen's lost 7-4. Georgetown's Brian Hayward is the number one goaltender at Cornell.

South said there were approximately 80 players vying for a position on the Queen's roster.

The team is coached by Fred O'Donnell, who put in quite a few years in the National Hockey League. His heyday was with the Boston Bruins.

"I'm really enjoying university hockey," he said. "It's

really clean with not much fighting or cheap shots."

South is still looking for his first goal in university play, but he has recorded four assists.

"We got quite a few excellent forwards who can really put the puck in the net," he said. "I'm concentrating on preventing goals being scored on us, not scoring them."

He said there are nine or so players on the squad who played Major Junior A.

South is majoring in commerce.
