Varian lands contract

From the Ottawa Bureau Of The Herald OTTAWA—Varian Associates Ltd. in Halton Hills has won three federal contracts with the defence department which total more than \$148,000 the department of supply and services has announced. Under the terms of two of the agreements, Varian will deliver 126,000 worth of electron tubes, while the third contract provides for a chemical analysis instrument and components valued at \$21,636.

At the same time, the department announced the award of another defence contract to the Flexionics division of UOP Products Ltd., which will be paid \$15,424 for tollows. They were among 219 unclassified contracts worth \$10,000 or more that were awarded by the department to Canadian during the week ended Dec. 1. Total value of the contracts amounted to \$9,625,125.

Geminis top Sabres

The Georgetown Geminis got scoring from other players rather than the Andy Broadbent line to defeat the slump-ridden Sabres 6-4 in Acton last Wednesday. In the last month the Geminis have been carried by Broadbent and his wingers Marty Power and Steve Crossman. Against the Sabres that line recorded only one scoring point. The Geminis got scoring from their other lines, but it was the blue liners that accounted for most of the goals. The loss marked the Sabres tenth in a row. Their last victory came over the powerful, Georgetown, 5-4 on Dec. 24.

The Sabres jumped in front in the game when Denis Charbonneau tallied at the 6:55 mark of the first frame. Glenn Murray earned the assist. The marker came with the Geminis' Broadbent off serving an interference penalty. The Sabres went up by two when Paul Salvisburg scored on a play set up by Wade Vickery. Bob Allison finally put the Geminis on the board as he converted on a play set up by Greg Thompson.

The Geminis took the lead for the first time in the game with 2:05 left in the second period. Another defenseman accounted for that score. Mark Euteneier was the marksman and Tim Turner and Barnes earned the assists. The goal came with the Sabres' Kelly Shaw in the box serving a slashing infraction. MOFFATT BUSY The Geminis forced Moffatt to make 15 saves in this period while Saija stopped 10. The first half of the final frame was scoreless as the game tightened up somewhat. At the 9:20 mark Power notched what proved to be the winning goal for the Geminis with Barnes and Euteneier setting him up. The Sabres got back to within one at 13:39 as Mark Schinkel tallied from Neil Anderson. Greg Thompson tallied an insurance marker for the Geminis with 4:40 showing on the clock. Allison set up the goal. The victory snapped a three-game losing streak for the Geminis, whose last victory before Wednesday's had also come over the Sabres. Last Saturday the Geminis lost 4-3 to the Oak Ridges Dynes with Euteneier, Rick Hotter and captain Bob McCandless scoring in a losing cause. As for the Sabres the loss was just a continuation of the team's troubles. Earlier in the week the Sabres lost 6-3 to the Barrie Colts and 8-4 to the Oakville Blades.

Georgetown has had little trouble with their cross-town rivals this year. The two teams have met three times and the Geminis have grabbed all six points. Action started the season in a hurry, but they have slowed down to a crawl. After being in the first division early in the campaign, the Sabres now have only the Geminis below them in the standings. MANY PENALTIES As is usually the case when the Sabres and Geminis meet, the game was marred by penalties. There were five fights in the game and an assortment of cheap penalties for slashing, highsticking, unsportsmanlike conduct, roughing and cross-checking.

Conservative MPP wants Cantrakon built

Herald Special MPP Jack Johnson (P.C.-Wellington-Dufferin-Peel), whose riding includes Caledon, has tabled a 1,000-signature petition in the provincial legislature supporting development of the proposed \$16-million Cantrakon conference centre at its currently-proposed site. Johnson, who said earlier he would 'fight like hell' to keep the controversial centre in Acton, said the petition was signed by 1,000 Caledon residents. The petition was referred to Housing Minister Claude Bernet. The centre is proposed for construction on Niagara Escarpment lands northwest of Inglewood. Bennett ordered the centre approved Aug. 31 over the objections of the Niagara Escarpment Commission, which had turned down an application for a development permit. Bennett's move raised a storm of protest from the Caledon Ratepayers' Association, which represents members in Caledon's Ward 1 (former Caledon township) in which the proposed site is located; opposition parties in the legislature, and other groups. Liberals in the legislature moved at one point to cut Bennett's ministerial salary from his ministry's budget in protest over his actions — a move Premier William Davis said he would consider a question of confidence, which would have led to an election if the Conservative government had been defeated on the Liberal motion. The Liberals backed down when Bennett agreed to convene a meeting of interested parties to discuss alternate sites. Cantrakon officials have been examining more than 30 alternatives, most of them in the Caledon area. Johnson said in a Conservative caucus news release that the development would 'upgrade the present use of the property from a weed-infested, fire hazard to a landscaped, well-maintained area which will increase local property values,' and will bring tax revenue, jobs, and a market for local suppliers of goods and services.
