

Slater says printouts prove route is poor

Kenneth Slater, president of Slater Energy Consultants Incorporated, a former Ontario Hydro engineer and an Ontario Energy Board engineering expert told the board that his study of computer printouts on Ontario Hydro tests of their various proposed routes showed that the Bruce to Milton route is not the best one available.

Speaking at the OMB's hydro corridor hearing Wednesday, he said, in checking the material supplied in the fall of 1977 he did not question the accuracy of the individual computer runs. He simply disagreed with the conclusions Hydro drew from their material.

Mr. Slater said that in his report released to the ICG and the Minister of Energy in Dec. 1977 he said hydro calculations showed that the line from Bruce to Milton is 109 miles long without instability occurring. But Bruce to Essa is 114 miles and some instability occurs at such a distance.

What Mr. Slater questioned was Hydro's decision to avoid

going beyond the critical line length, he said. Instable conditions and avoiding them by adjusting power flows are a normal, every day occurrence at a power plant, he said, and thus Hydro had placed "far too much importance on avoiding a line of less than critical length".

He felt that the shorter lines might also not be stable at another load level but Hydro failed to study other conditions. Hydro would not have to suffer any large financial loss because of backing down the amount of power produced by the Bruce generators because he estimated that there would only be 13 weeks a year in which all eight generators would be available. By his estimates Hydro would lose about half a day's power production in a year over adjustments to accommodate changes necessary to avoid problems and he didn't consider that to be any great economic loss.

CHECKING ROUTES
In checking the routes, Mr. Slater said, Hydro had only considered what would happen if all the circuits on a common right-of-way were lost. They had made no examination of what would happen if the system lost all the lines from

one switching, transforming or generating station. He felt that a station was much more vulnerable than a short piece of line. When he checked the route using the supposition that the Milton switching station was out of commission he found the route had very poor fault transfer capabilities. The capabilities were, in fact, as low as those on the Bruce to Essa line which Hydro had considered unacceptable.

Any system that offers only two crossings of the escarpment would be very poor value for money invested considering the amount of money involved in such a project, he said.

Mr. Slater said he knew of no studies that showed technical problems in making three crossings of the escarpment with hydro lines. While it might not be practical from an environmental standpoint it should offer no technical problems, he said.

Asked to capsize his findings as laid down in the Slater report Mr. Slater said that of the eight systems Hydro studied, systems involving a line from Bruce to Essa were superior to those which channelled all the lines from Bruce to Naticoke through one switching station.

Isabelle Moore

The last member of the family who originally owned the Moore Park subdivision when it was a farm died Dec. 25 in Guelph General Hospital. Isabelle Stewart Moore was 87. Miss Moore was born on an Esquimaux township farm at the corner of 15 Sideroad and the 3rd Line and came to Georgetown when her parents bought the farm on the western outskirts of town in 1897. She received her public and high school education in Georgetown and attended Hamilton normal school. She taught in Blue Mountain public school on the Sixth Line and later in Clarkson. Miss Moore and her two sisters took over the family farm when their father died in 1923 and she continued to operate it until the early 1960s when it was sold in preparation for the construction of the

Moore Park subdivision. Miss Moore was a long-time member of Knox Presbyterian Church, a charter member of Silverwood-Women's Institute and a member of Georgetown Horticultural Society. Miss Moore had been a resident of Mapleview Lodge, near Acton for six years. She is survived by a niece and nephew, Jean and Jim Laddell. Miss Moore was predeceased by her parents, James Moore and Thomasine Hume Moore, and brothers and sisters, Mary, Elizabeth, William and Alexander in 1884, Edith Moore in 1955, Janet Moore Ruddle in 1957, and Margaret Moore in 1957. Funeral services were held from Acture-Jones Funeral Home at 2 p.m. on Dec. 28 with interment following in Greenwood cemetery.

Subdivision okay with Halton

Halton regional council has endorsed an amendment to the official plan for the former town of Acton that will enable North Halton Real Estate Ltd. to develop a 12-acre residential subdivision off Main Street in the community's north end.

Council last Wednesday accepted the planning committee's recommendation to inform the provincial ministry of housing that it has no objection to the official plan amendment provided that the subdivision site is "suitably buffered against noise" to meet ministry of environment standards.

The subdivision plan got past both the committee and council but not without a number of concerns being expressed over the site's close proximity to a CNR line used by up to a dozen trains a day.

PROJECT FAILED
Halton Hills Mayor Pete Pomeroy conceded that the project failed to win unanimous support among members of the council if it approves the subdivision.

FIRST-HAND
His remark prompted Coun. Booth to suggest that Coun. Planche should visit Acton and observe the planning situation first-hand. Coun. Planche took exception to the suggestion, responding that he is well

aware of Acton's zoning layout.

Coun. McLean Anderson of Oakville pointed out that the project involves only 12 acres of industrial land.

Oakville Coun. Ron Planche, however, questioned the wisdom of trading industrially-zoned areas for residential sites and warned that council is "just asking for future planning problems further down the line of his own council, but again stressed that noise problems can be overcome with a minimum of trouble.

"Acton is in a peculiar position with this track running through the centre of town," Halton Hills' Ward 1 Coun. Ed Wood explained, noting that several other subdivisions have already been built along the line and have brought no serious complaints from residents. He called the project "in-filling" development, rather than an extension to Acton's urban envelope.

Coun. Roy Booth of Halton Hills told regional council that approval for the project is already "well down the road." An endorsement by the region, he said, is only a formality.
