## Meet the coaches

The Georgetown Standard Products Major Pee Wee's Graham Tyler may be the most travelled coach in the Rep system.

Tyler has been coaching for 15 years and made stops in Halifax, Montreal, Toronto, Mississauga, Kingston and Georgetown. Most of those years he has coached youngsters nine to 12 years old in either house leagues or all-star.

The coach, who is coaching in Georgetown for the first year, said he notices that the Georgetown youngsters are not as well trained in the individual facets of the game as they are in the bigger cities.

"I'm working now in helping players with the individual aspects of hockey," Tyler told The Herald.

Tyler sees skating as the most important attributes a young hockey player can possess. He also says that hockey sense, passing, shooting and size are also important to him in choosing players to play for the rep team.

Tyler said he has three goals this year. To improve the team play on his club, to do well in the OMHA playdowns and to improve his player's individual skills.

Tyler is also a believer that hockey attracts the best youths. "I've yet to run into a bad kid in all the years I have been coaching," he said.

He has two youngsters and they both play hockey. One with the Atom 4-Town and the other with the house league minor atoms.

The second game, against White Oaks high, was a much closer contest even though the point spread was the same as White Oaks came out on top by a score of 47-30.

"There has to be a lot of work put into our defence if we expect to improve," said coach Phil Peardon.
