Ottawa breezes to tournament win

The talent-ladden Ottawa 79s were clearly the class of the thirteenth annual Georgetown Midget Hockey Tournament and emerged as champions with a 9-2 victory over Richmond Hill in the final.

The 79s, a team gearing up to take a run at the Canada Cup championship, were only really seriously challenged in one of four games. In the second-round they had to squeak out a 6-4 win over a tenacious group of young hockey players from Bowmanville.

LOST COOL

The Bowmanville game was the only one in which the poised 79s lost their cool. They got into penalty problems which enabled Bowmanville to fight back after

trailing 4-1 late in the second periods.

In the final against Richmond Hill there was never a doubt as Ottawa built up a 8-0 lead before their foes finally got on the board.

For Ottawa, who are running away with the league title in the Ottawa Valley District, it was their second tournament win. Earlier they had won their own Ottawa International. In that tournament there were 16 top teams, including the Toronto Marlboros, St. Michael's a Detroit team and the best midget team from Buffalo.

In another big tournament in Timmons Ottawa went to the final where Sault Ste. Marie beat them out.

The 79s will now play in several tournaments including Drummondville, Hull,

Sorel, and Richmond Hill as they ready themselves for the Canada Cup series. The Canada Cup, the replacement for the Wrigley, will be In April at Winnipeg, Manitoba. •

"We will have a tough time getting out of our own district for the Canada Cup," said manager Bert Brookes. "There are some very good teams up there."

Brookes said the top midget teams he has seen so far this year are Buffalo, Detroit and Oshawa. Only the last one is a potential opponent for Ottawa in the Canada Cup playdowns.

Ottawa's main strength is team balance. Every player coach Doug Lavallee sent out to take a shift gave it his all. They also have good team size and speed.

Centreman Geoff Dervin, a big, smooth player in the Jean Believeau tradition, was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

BEST PLAYER OUT

Brookes said that Junior scouts have expressed much interest in Dervin, but he said the player attracting the most attention did not even suit up here.

Defenseman Andy Schliebener is said to be the team's most talented player and Brookes said he would be very surprised if he is not playing in the Junior "A" loop next year. A charley horse kept him out of action

Another strong player on the team is centreman Roger Cloutier, who is one of the team's four minor midget

aged players. The others are centre Jim Byrne, goaltender and winger Brian Trombley. All are very talented and should be certain future Junior "A" players.

This tournament was very reminiscent of last year's in which Peterborough ran away with the championship side. There was much debate around the arena as to whether this Ottawa team could beat Peterborough. That matchup would certainly have been very interesting.

Peterborough had a better skating team, but Ottawa has more size. Peterborough had excellent goal scorers and so does Ottawa. A game between the two powers would certainly have been a show case of midget hockey at its

tournament it was thought Brampton Triple "A" would be able to give Ottawa a battle. The two teams met in the semi-final and Ottawa took an easy 6-2 victory.

The Brampton squad, who had just returned from a tour of Czechosolovakia were the dirtiest and chippiest team in the tournament. Their only competitor in that category was the Double A team from the same city.

A member of the team said they picked up a new bag full of dirty tricks in their tour of Czechoslovakia where several of their players were cut and bruised by their European opponents. In any event they were not even in the same league as the 79s when it came to basic hockey skills and team play.

Rarely did Brampton play at full strength in the contest as they took 15 minors and had two of their players ejected. Georgetown had only four minors called against them.
