

# Hayward sparkling

Brian Hayward and his Big Red hockey team at Cornell University are rolling along and heading for a third consecutive Ivy League championship.

So far this season Cornell has a record of five wins and two losses in league play and eight wins and three losses overall.

Hayward is the team's starting goaltender and he has just come off a very big week. He was named the ECAC Rookie of the Week for his play in the Cornell Holiday Festival tournament and he was named the ECAC Goaltender of the Week for his play in his club's 5-1 victory over Boston University.

Hayward has played in eight of Cornell's 11 games so far this season. He has a very respectable 3.38 goals against average.

Another interesting statistic kept at Cornell is the goaltender's save percentage. Hayward has stopped 87.9 per cent of the shots fired at him.

The press released sent out by Cornell states that Hayward is a graduate of Erindale Secondary School in Mississauga. Actually the goaltender, who is also an excellent student, graduated from Georgetown district high school and was the valedictorian this past year.

He attended Erindale for grades 10 and 11, but returned to GDHS for grade 12 and 13.

At Cornell Hayward, who is a freshman, is a business administration major and is enrolled in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

Of the 24 players on the Cornell squad, 18 are Canadians on scholarship. Sixteen of the 18 are from Ontario with the other two hailing from Quebec.

## Pee Wees split two games

The Georgetown United Rent-A-Minor Pee Wees split two close decisions last week beating Dundas 3-1 and then being nipped 2-1 by Oakville.

Against Dundas Brent Smith opened the scoring in the second period after a scoreless first frame. Keith Rieger assisted on the play.

Dundas came back to score a notching goal, but before the period was out Georgetown had scored two more goals.

Rieger got the first one from Smith and Todd Cull and Wayne Morrow tallied the second one from Mike O'Brien.

Manager Brian James said goaltender Stephen Roy, Smith, Rieger and defenseman Stephen Turner were standouts in the contest.


Cull opened the scoring against Oakville with a goal in the first period. Smith and Rieger had the assists on the goal. Before the first period was over Oakville came back to tie the score and in the second period they put in the winner.

Last night the Minor Pee Wees opened their OMHA best of five playdown round against Dundas.

Hayward was a member of the Centennial Cup winning Guelph Holody Platers last year. Paul Kistner, another member of last year's Plater team, is also enrolled on scholarship at Cornell and is at the same college as Hayward.

5-1 victory over Boston University was very important to the Big Red. Boston is the defending NCAA champion and is one of the teams expected to make a good run at taking the crown this year. Cornell's win, with Hayward being a student, should be a good gauge of the Big Red's chances of going all the way.
