tion, he suggested that the terms of reference be revised to require only one ward representative.
Mr. Day acknowledged that Bill 151 does not allow council to appoint a standing recreation committee, but pointed out that advisory committees are not precluded.

Coun. Russ Miller told Mr. Day that he appreciates the work done by the RAC's in the past but said he was discouraged last year to learn that only one Halton Hills resident had applied for membership on the 1979 RAC. In investigating the reasons behind the Ward 1 and 2 RAC's decision to disband in 1976, Coun. Miller reported that its members felt the RAC was not being run properly.

EXPRESSED PREFERENCE
Local residents have since expressed preference for approaching their elected representatives on council rather than working through an advisory committee, he added.
Noting that a near-majority of councillors voted to disband the RAC, Mayor Pomeroy said he feels sorry for citizens like Mr. Day who tried to make the RAC format work. Others felt they should be given a chance to continue.
"If we have an advisory committee that's willing to work for the community and there's no money to be spent, I think we should be taking advantage of the situation," Coun. Mike Armstrong commented. "Leaving this until the end of the year is like saying goodbye to these people. I don't want to look a gift horse in the mouth."
Coun. Armstrong suggested that the committee's consideration of the matter should be delayed until Feb. 12, at which time Mr. Day offered to submit a list of applicants for membership on the RAC. His own reason for voting to disband the RAC, he explained, was because of the poor citizen response.
Coun. Roy Booth recalled

that Halton Hills once had a planning advisory committee in addition to its two RAC's. The last one to disband - Georgetown's RAC - turned out to be only "conditionally successful", he said.
"I don't want to sound mean, but council just didn't get the kind of input from (the RAC) for the amount of energy (the members) put into it," he contended. "Council usually just received and filed their minutes because they rarely came up with anything we could act on."
Coun. Booth called the RAC's revised terms of reference a further restriction upon a group whose members already felt "ineffectual".
FRUSTRATING EXPERIENCE
Support for the RAC's reformation was offered by Councillors Ross Knechtel and Marilyn Serjeantson, but Coun. Ed Wood, who was the Ward 1 and 2 RAC's last chairman, recalled that his colleagues on the RAC regarded their service as a "very frustrating experience".

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HRCA GETS GRANT
The Halton Regional Conservation Authority plans to use a \$20,000 provincial grant for further development of the Burns Nature Area, eight miles northeast of Milton. The area now has picnicking, hiking, fishing and nature study facilities and plans to construct an observation tower, with nature display, landscaping and development of a service road and picnic area. Various wildlife, forest and stream management demonstration projects will be developed along with more nature trails and a boardwalk. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$40,000.
