Liberal MP discusses bank act changes as Grits gather for their annual meeting

Two major proposals dealing with the banking system of Canada are being studied, MP Bob Kaplan, chairman of the House of Commons standing committee on finance, trade and economic affairs, told the Brampton-Georgetown Federal Liberal Association annual meeting in Brampton Monday.

Kaplan, Liberal MP for York Centre, said that the first proposal would allow private groups easier access to form a . to enter Canada. bank in Canada. He said that if the motion is adopted, a group could apply to the government, be approved by the cabinet after an extensive study, and then start a bank. The current method, he said, is a lot more difficult and time-consuming. and very few banks are allow-

The banks would constantly be under heavy scrutiny by the government to make sure they are solidly based and safe for the consumer. No bank has ever falled in Canada since 1923, he said, and he wouldn't want to see it happen now.

Existing banks are very the consumer much chance to shop around, said Kaplan. The consumer begin to feel like very logical, that just because

they are confined to only one system, he said.

NEW BANKS

New banks would create more competition and allow the public more choice, he said. Kaplan said he already has four applications from groups which would like to start their own banks.

The second proposal under discussion is whether or not to allow foreign-controlled banks

"It has been proposed that we open our doors to foreign banks and allow them to operate in Canado," Kaplan said. "If we did, we would impose heavy restrictions on them. We would only allow them to open five branches each, to have a capital of \$5 million, and they would be allowed a total presence in our economy of no more than 15 per cent of the total banking business."

Kaplan said there has been a lot of objection to the new proposal.

"It has been argued that we already have too much of our economy controlled by foreign powerful, and they don't give groups, that we have to place tighter controls on them," he said. "But I don't think that is

other foreign groups are creat- he said. ing concern, we have to tell the banking industry to forget it."

"There is also concern that the foreign companies in Canada will switch to the foreign ed unemployed." banks," he said. "There is that they will stay with Canadian banks."

He said that the Canadian banking system is one of the strongest in the world and if foreign banks are allowed in. then Canadians will be able to see how good their banks really are.

"I think that we can also count on Canadians to stay with the Canadian banks," he said, "and the competition will only help to make them better deals."

"I think that they will help Canadians and they will also help to internationalize our banking system."

On topic of the Canadian economy, Kaplan said that the people of Canada are being unduly concerned.

ECONOMY CHANGING

"I conceded that the economy is changing, and that people are either losing their jobs or looking for new ones, but that can be argued with the fact that there are more people working in Canada than ever before," he said. The trouble is the unemployment statistics,

"The statistics are compiled by people being asked if they are looking for work. If they answer yes, they are consider-

"If we look into this, we can evidence to make me believe see why so many people are unemployed, because a lot of housewives who haven't worked for years are deciding they want to get a job to have until 1971. looking for work instead of continuing their education," said Kaplan. "It's not the economy to worry about, it just looks bad now because we have a greater demand for work.
