

Agency formed to assist handicapped

Developmentally handicapped people in Halton Region will now have an agency in Halton to co-ordinate services for them and their families with the formation of the Halion Region Case Managment Services.

Case Management Services, which was formed in January, 1979, is actually a three-person leam whose goals are to identify the special needs of developmentally handicapped people and their families, to find services to fulfill those needs, and to co-ordinate those services. A secondary goal of the service is to identify needs which aren't being met and try to develop services to fill the

Margaret Riggin is the person responsible to the North Hallon area, with Tony Lipsey based in Oakville and Paula McPartand Hati based in Burl-

The first step in the work of Case Management Services is to make the developmentally handicapped person and his family aware of the services that exist to fill their needs in education, health care, vocalional training, financial assitance and other areas. Services are available in Halton already, such as the Halton Developmental Centre, the Tinkerbell Nursery, and the Adult Rehabiliation Centre in Hornby.

The Case Management Services office is located at Sheridan College, 1430 Trafalgar Road in Oakville. Any person or family who is having difficulty meeting the needs of a developmentally handicapped member of their family, friend can contact Margaret Riggin at 845-9430, Extension 316.
