Lower speed limit for Glen Williams

Halton regional council has approved a public works committee recommendation lowering the maximum speed limit along Regional Road 13 (Main Street) in Glen Williams from 60 to 50 kilometres per hour.


A bylaw will be prepared placing the lower speed limitin effect between Confederalion Street and the northern boundary of the hamlet, in response to a letter sent to the region by Glen homeowner T.D. Gorman.

Mr. German pointed out that the switch to kilometres on roadside speed limit signs ended up increasing the limit in comparison to the old limit of 35 miles per hour. Some motorists, he said, can be seen negotiating the winding curves of the narrow main thoroughfare in "le Mans fashion"


resulting in five injuries to pedestrians and passengers as well as nearly \$13,000 in property damage during recent

As council voted to approve the speed limit reduction, Oakville Coun. Terry Mannell questioned the reason why almost a month had passed between the time Mr. Gorman's letter arrived and the time it was placed before the public works committee.

Halton Hills Mayor Pete Pomeroy joked that regional staff may have been ignorant as to the location of Glen Williams, while Coun. Russ Miller of Halton Hills explained more seriously that the December municipal election and the subsequent transition between councils were likely responsible for the delay.
