Minor Pee Wee win OMHA series over Owen Sound

The Georgetown United Rent-All Minor Pee Wees have advanced in OMHA play after defeating Owen Sound in five games.

Owen Sound forced a fifth and deciding game after winning 2-0 up north Saturday. The two teams travelled back here for a Sunday match and Georgetown won easily 5-1.

"You wouldn't believe it was the same team if you saw them in the two games," Georgetown manager Brian James said about his club. "We were really flat there Saturday."

Tim S. Wilson, a super player, got both goals for Owen Sound in their win. Stephen Roy played a solid

game in the net for Georgetown.

It was a different story back here Sunday as the Georgetown shooters found the range and some tough checking kept Wilson from exploding.

First period goals by Danny King, from Wayne Morrow and Mike O'Brien and Todd Cull, from Scott Farley, put Georgetown ahead.

Owen Sound got the only goal of the second frame, but Georgetown fired three home in the third period and the series was won.

Keith Rieger got the first goal on a play set up by Brent Smith. King then tallied from Morrow and Morrow got the last goal, his fortieth of the

campaign, to finish off the scoring.

Georgetown was led by defenseman Stephen Marcolini and King and Morrow who were all excellent.

Georgetown will face Barrie in the next OMHA round. In league play Georgetown defeated Burlington 6-3. They scored three in the first period and never looked back.

This season the league is considering cutting back in teams which may be dictated by diamond time available and to create a keen competition amongst players desiring to make a team and play in the Industrial League.

The first organizational meeting of the year is to be held Thursday March 1 at 7:30 in the Cedarvale Com-

munity Centre in the downstairs kitchen. All teams that were in the League last year have been sent notices of the meeting, but this meeting is open to anyone interested in entering a team into the League or any one who may be interested in acting in an executive position.

This year the League is scheduled to open on Sunday, May 6 which is one week earlier than last year in an attempt to beat the cold weather and dampness that plagued the play-offs during the past season.
