Senior volleyballers lose in Halton final

A seeming jinx has continued into the third year as the GDHS senior girls volleyball team again lost the Halton finals, this time to host Blakelock High.

Alter lighting through a tough five game set with Oakville-Trafalgar on the Oakville courts, the Rebs went over to Blakelock for the finals and ended up on the short end of close 15-12, 15-13, 15-13 scores.

The Rebs ended up the regular season tied in points with Oakville-Trafalgar, but due to a loss to Oakville during the season, had to journey to Oakville for the semi-final match.

HAD MOMENTUM

The girls had a lot of momentum which in the first contest they won rather easily 15-10. The fast start continued on into the second set as the Rebs builts up a 13-15 lead.

Then the bubble burst as Oakville-Trafalgar held the girls scoreless while picking up ten points and the win.

In the third contest, the Rebs seemed to be still thinking about the second as they were soundly trounced 5-15.

Facing elimination and a 11-14 deficit in the fourth game, the senior Rebs reached back for that extra effort. On match point, Monica Pollock made an unbelieveable save to get serve for Georgetown who then put the game away by a score of 16-14.

Now it was Oakville-Trafalgar's turn to think about what may have been as the Rebs put the match away with a 15-9 fifth and final game score.

In the Halton finals, Georgetown met Blakelock High who were fresh from a big win against top seated Burlington Central.

Despite their top rating, the Rebs had hoped to meet the Burlington squad because Blakelock had a history of coming up tough in the playoffs.

WELL-FOUNDED This fear proved to be well founded, as the Rebs dropped three straight matches.

"The key was the first game," coach Moe Leeking said. "We had an 11-3 lead and ended up losing. That killed us." In the second contest, Blakelock opened up a big lead but the girls whittled away until they had a 13-12 lead.

Blakelock was not to be denied however, and managed to get the serve and salt the game away.

Lecking went on to say, "We just couldn't get the key point. The same thing happened to us last year against Oakville. Blakelock played well and capitalized on our inexperience. The pressure

finally got to us." Nancy Phillips played outstanding volleyball and was by far the best player on both


